My Lord,

I have the honour to request permission to open a Suspense Account in connection with the Education Department Estimates to which the receipts and expenditure for scholars' boarding expenses are referred.

Under Colonial Regulation 226 it is laid down that all receipts should be credited to the Revenue. As a necessary auxiliary all expenditure must be estimated fair, and if this cannot be done, against it a provision like this however should be made so as to charge to cover the cost of raising the children's suspense account until

The Education Board and the unofficial members of it in particular are strongly opposed to the Education Vote being raised by the same amount as many other irreducible charges are marked in General Protectorate revenue. They say, with some justice, that the amount spent on Education may thus be made to appear unduly large in comparison with the results obtained.
