Gratuity.

Sir,

I have the honour to state for the information of the Earl of Crewe that Eonvasi Gopi, Senior Hamal of this Office has tendered his resignation as from 1st May next as he wishes to retire from service on account of old age.

2. He joined the Office on 1st September 1890 and will thus have put in a service of 19 years and 8 months on 30th April next with breaks of 1 month and 25 days in 1905 and 1 month and 25 days in 1906 = 3 months and 23 days in all. - During these periods he received no pay. -

3. His initial pay was Rs. 11/- per month and he is at present receiving Rs. 12/- per month. -

4. He has rendered faithful and satisfactory service and in recognition of it I should be glad if His Lordship could be pleased to grant him a gratuity of say 3 months' pay - Rs. 36 - (22-8-0) or such other amount as His Lordship might deem proper. - This Extra grant be set against the expenditure sanctioned for Sepoys' Salaries for 1909-10 as there is a saving of one Sepoy's salary for over 5 months namely Rs. 69-12-0 (24-13-0). -

Dear Mr. Road,

The experiment referred to in Lord Cromer's  
Confidential despatch to Governor Sir J. H. Seeley dated the 20th  
of August 1908 - of working this office during my absence by an  
officer from Africa has now been tried. - It is my conviction it has  
not been a success and I do not consider the office has  
been conducted well. I am sorry it should have been in my hands  
permitted to express my views. I should say that the duties this  
Agency is called upon to perform - which have to be carried out  
entirely on personal responsibility, with nobody to consult -  
are so diverse, present so many details, are liable to critic-  
ism from such different points of view, and require such care-  
ful attention to detail for the safeguarding of Government, that  
it is not possible to carry them out with efficiency without training in  
the necessary - the requisite qualifications for carrying out such  
duties in India in the present day.

I am sorry I had the pleasure of writing to you last  
year about my special leave of one month annually, you desired me  
to let you know what suggestions I could make and as it is possi-  
ble that my above remarks may lead to some alteration in the sys-  
tem upon which this Agency is worked I remain, Sir, your  
ward and affectionate son for the present.
