7th, 1910.

Inform Mr. Zaphiro that he is granted 4 months' leave on full pay, in accordance with his request reported in your telegram No. 39 of December . He should not resume his official duties on the frontier without further orders, as the arrangements for the permanent administration of the frontier have not yet been definitely settled.
