I HAVE the honour to enclose herewith a letter signed by Mr. W. Blain,
Executive Engineer, Public Works Department.

The man Sher Singh, Mistri, presented the letter to me saying he had
brought eight men down from Punjab on the strength of it and requested
permission to be allowed to leave for Mombasa.

The men were of a good type and I allowed them to proceed in consi-
deration of the expenses they had incurred and in view of the ease with which
they could have evaded the provisions of the Emigration Act either by coming
separately and saying that they were going at their own risk or by leaving
from Goa or even by sending a deputy well furnished with the necessary answers
to my questions.

I have brought the matter to 1906 as Mr. Blain's letter is a direct
contravention of Chapter XI, section 75, of the Indian Emigration Act, XVII
of 1906, and of the request in the connection made by the Colonial Office,
vide G.O. No. 2702 of the 20th May 1909.

My Lord,

With reference to the correspondence ending with Mr. J. Lyall's letter No. J and F. 1907, dated the 25th May 1909, we have the honour to forward a copy of a letter No. 503, dated the 2nd February 1910, and its enclosure to the Government of Bombay, relating to the irregular recruitment of persons to the Indian Police in British East Africa. The irregularity complained of was the contravention of Section 15 of the Indian Emigration Act, 1906 (XVI of 1906), and is punishable under Section 29 of the Act. We would therefore request that the matter may be brought to the notice of the authorities of the British East Africa Protectorate.
