With reference to my letter 477 of the 11th instant, relative to the grant of leave of absence to Mr. Zaphiro, I am directed by Secretary Sir E. Grey to transmit to you herewith, for the information of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, a copy of a despatch from His Majesty's Minister at Adis Ababa on the subject.

The question of the payment of Mr. Zaphiro's travelling expenses is one for the decision of the Earl of Crewe, but I am to observe in this connexion that members of His Majesty's Legation at Adis Ababa are allowed, under an arrangement sanctioned by the Treasury on November 27th, 1908, to charge full travelling expenses for journeys on leave between that place and Jibuti. In view of the good work done by Mr. Zaphiro and of the fact that he was obliged to return to Adis Ababa from the frontier in connexion
