Sir:-

I am directed by Secretary Sir E. Grey to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 4809/10 of the 16th ultimo respecting the question of allowing ivory emanating from the Congo State, which fulfils the conditions of the Canada law but not those of the East Africa Protectorate law on the subject, to pass through the latter Protectorate.

In view of the destruction of elephants that there has been in the Lake Equave and of the fact that that territory will not be actually handed over to the Sudan Administration until June next, I am to suggest, for the consideration of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, that it might be as well to adhere until then to the policy laid down in your letter of July 20th last, namely, that no alteration should be made in the East Africa Protectorate Law unless and until the Belgian or any other Foreign Government makes representations
