PRINCE GEORGE AND PRINCE HENRI OF BAVARIA
VISIT TO EAST AFRICA

Forwards copy of letter received from London stating that they propose to visit East Africa on a shooting expedition and requesting special facilities for them in regard to Customs, shooting of animals etc.

As regards Customs privileges, refer to the Treasury, calling attention to the previous cases of the Duke of the Abruzzi (Treas^y 106 10/06) & the Duke of Saxe-Coburg (Treas^y 16411/07 E.A.P.)

As regards Shooting privileges, the Govt under section 23 of the Game Order 1409 (sec 29 of Act 5136 herewith) may issue a Special license permitting the holder to kill any mammal (number of animals for scientific purposes).

My dear Langley,

Count La Ponce, the Adjutant of Prince George of Bavaria, called on me the other day and informed me that Prince George and Prince Konrad intended going on a shooting expedition to East Africa shortly, and enquired whether I could obtain leave for them to shoot certain kinds of game in cases of that allowed under the new regulations.

As his requests were rather too complicated to deal in my head, I asked him to write to me stating the several points he wished me to put forward. I now enclose a translation of his letter and hope that possibly the Authorities concerned may be willing to waive some of the new shooting regulations in favour of the Princes, and may also allow some Customs facilities.

As they propose to arrive in Mombasa on the 6th of September, you will see that I ought to let them know without too much delay, as possibly their plans depend to some extent upon the reply we give.

I am not quite clear as to the names of some of the animals mentioned, as the German writing in the letter is almost illegible.

Sir:-

With reference to our recent conversation I have the honour on behalf of Prince George and Prince Konrad of Bavaria to address the following request to you.

Their Royal Highnesses intend arriving in Mombasa on the 6th of September by the Nord Deutscher Lloyd Steamer "Prinz Regent" accompanied by Councillor Dr. Bürkel and undertake a several months shooting expedition.

They request your intervention in the following matters

By the new regulations concerning shooting in British East Africa considerable limitations have been imposed. But as the expedition of the Princes is undertaken not only for sport but also in the interests of science, that is to say, with the object of enriching the Bavarian State Collections, they would ask whether they might not receive permission with respect to certain zones to shoot under the old regulations.

They would specially request to be allowed 10 Pallas (?) Antelopes each, 5 Waterbuck each of the commonest

commonest sort, the like number of Grant Gazelles and Buffalo, and 2 Elandsabei, Roan Antelope and Kudu a piece

Their Royal Highnesses would make a further request to the effect that they might be given a Customs' Pass, that is to say that their baggage, guns, &c., be permitted to enter without Customs' examination.
