19 July

Since we are now in a position to make a statement  
that seems certain further may be  
possible.

To Friends: I presume that to write another  
letter would be useless so I will do the  
best I can to give you a brief account of  
the present situation. The first  
part of the letter I wrote you on the 15th  
of June I will repeat here. We had  
a terrible rain on the 14th and 15th  
so heavy that the land became quite  
soft, many trees were uprooted,  
but we have yet felt quite safe.  
The present situation is as follows:  
I fear we shall soon have to leave  
as there is no food left. The natives  
will be sent to the P.D. 15 miles  
to the land which is opposite to the

the T.A.P. who will w. doubt do what  
is in their power to further the object  
of the Committee's visit - & add that,  
with a view to laying down a clear rule  
for the future. Lord Curzon would suggest  
for his Excellency's information that the Treasury should  
only be asked to render a certificate
