Sir:-

With reference to my letter of the 13th ultimo respecting the Southern Frontier of Abyssinia, I am directed by Secretary Sir E. Grey to transmit to you herewith, to be laid before the Secretary of State for the Colonies, a copy of a despatch from His Majesty's Minister at Adis Abeba reporting an interview with the Ritterari Hafta Giorgis respecting Abyssinian raids into British territory.

Sir E. Grey would propose, with the concurrence of the Earl of Crewe, to approve Mr. Thesiger's language as therein reported. With regard to the question of a cession to France of the hinterland of Zaila, I am to suggest that Mr. Thesiger should be told that no negotiations have even been entered upon or are proceeding with the French Government for the transfer of Zaila or its hinterland, but

SIR,

I have the honor to transmit herewith a copy of a despatch to Mr. Hope.

I had an interview on Friday last with the itinerant Major Giorgis, and impressed upon him the absolute necessity of putting a stop to the depredations on our territory, pointing out that in the last few months those had been committed every portion of the Southern frontier from Dolo to Lake Ash- doek, and that whilst they were always seeking for specimens of game, his own frontier troupe would not travel to the North of the two lakes, they allowed their hunters, "bullocki," and native drivers hunt and go as far as 100 miles south of Lake Ash-doe.

The Major acknowledged that he had practically no control over the Dabola-Nyaph tribes, and that if the difficulties could be removed the hunters in hand.

This interview resulted in my writing to the Secretary of State on Saturday 2nd October 1910, so that he should have the opportunity of consulting the Legation and that we should have a joint military patrol, and I reminded him that these people had been held up for five years in spite of continual protest from the Legation and that even now, in consequence of the recent raid from Dolo, none of our frontier guards had been sent to the frontier immediately afterwards, and that the result was that the rebels had increased in numbers.

good relations between the two countries and that our patience in this connection had limits, warning him at the same time that, willing as I was to arrange matters on a friendly footing, if they persisted in refusing to come to an agreement over the frontier, His Majesty's Government would certainly not allow the present state of things to continue, and would take the necessary action to stop it.

I also wrote to the Pitsuvari in the same sense on the advice of Mr. Collesserry with whom I have had one or two conversations on the subject. Mr. Collesserry, in his opinion of legal opinion to the Government, could be of great assistance to us in this connection, and has promised to do what he can to induce the Council to lay a matter in a reasonable light.

I have asked for another meeting with the cause, and hope that my conversation with the Pitsuvari will have had effect.

Communication with the disaffected might qualify Abyssinia in Governor's eyes, but I have heard a story which came up from Gondar to the effect that no friend of ours here is treating for thecession of the provinces of Tigray and Wello.

I have written to them that I am not in favour of such an idea and it has been agreed to credit the crediting these projects with any ill intention. It is well known that we have no influence over Abyssinia or its officials, and that any action taken by us in this connection may give occasion of匣ery. As I have reported before to the Secretary of State, we must be very careful in this matter.
