Sir:

I am attracted by Secretary Sir Edward Grey to acknowledge the receipt of your letter 30946/1910 of the 17th. instant enclosing the enquiry of the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate as to the exact meaning of the term "Navigable".

Sir E. Grey believes Hallack's definition to be correct, but I am inclined to go over to Rivier's statement "NAVIGABLE" definition contained in Hall's International Law respectively in KICHER'S 'Droits des Cours Modernes de l'Europe' and Rivier's 'Principes de Droit International', and also the definition of the word "Navigable" laid down in the art. of the third year Convention of the Danube signed at Constantinople on the 30th. September 1875.

I am to observe however that these definitions will refer to the class of navigable rivers. With regard to unnavigable rivers I am to state that the definition

Thalweg of the Danube.

2. The thalweg of the Danube is the continuous  
line of the deepest soundings, corresponding generally  
with the channel most suited to navigation down the  
river at the time when the waters are at their lowest  
ordinary level. In the case where the river is divided  
into two navigable branches, that of the two which in  
the course of the axis of its own particular bed (cours  
le cours de l'axe de son thalweg particulier), shall  
represent the deepest soundings shall be designated  
as the chief stream of the river.

Where a (a boundary) follows a river, and it is  
not proved that either of the riparian States possesses  
a good title to the whole bed, the territories are

separated by a line running down the middle except where the stream is navigable, in which case the center of the deepest channel, or, as it is usually called, the thalweg, is taken as the boundary.
