Sir,

Referring to your letter of the 8th ultimo, on the subject of the proposed appointment of two members of the Royal Irish Constabulary to the Police force of the East Africa Protectorate, I am directed by the Lords Justices to acquaint you, for the information of the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, that the Inspector General of the Royal Irish Constabulary, having been communicated with on the subject, has submitted the names of the two following candidates who have been pronounced by the Surgeon of the Force to be fit for service in a tropical climate:-

- (1) Acting Sergeant Angus Madden, No. 56708, age 29 years 2 months, service in the Royal Irish Constabulary 10 years 5 months and service in his present rank 2 years 4 months. He has no records, favourable or unfavourable. He obtained promotion to his rank as a result of a competitive examination conducted by the Civil Service Commissioners in literary subjects, and by a Board of Officers in police subjects.
- (2) Constable William J. Reilly, No. 56456, age 29 years 7 months, service in the Force 10 years 9 months. He has one favourable record for good police duty and no unfavourable record. He is at present attached to the Royal Irish Constabulary Band, but for 7 years he performed the ordinary duties of a Constable in different Counties in Ireland.
