With reference to your letter of the 8th of May last, No. 11847/1005, respecting certain vacant posts in the Postal and Telegraph Service of the East Africa and Uganda Protectorate I am directed to acquaint you, for the information of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, that the Postmaster General caused the vacancies to be advertized in the usual manner in the hope of obtaining suitable candidates. For the three vacancies for Postal Clerks and Telegraphists, however, very few candidates have come forward; and in Lord Stanley's opinion this result clearly shows that the inducements offered are not sufficient to attract the eligible men in the service of this Department. Only five applications were received for these appointments; and out of this number there are but two persons who can be recommended to the Secretary of State, namely Mr. C. P. Lewis, a Sorting Clerk & Telegraphist at Wokingham and Mr. J. J. Pearnain an officer of the same rank employed at the Soham Post Office.
