Sir,

With reference to the Colonial Office letter of the 22nd
October, No. 30265/05, relating to Mr. Holt, late Postmaster
of Mombasa. I am directed to state, for the information of
Mr. Secretary Lyttelton, that, in view of the circumstances
in which Mr. Holt's service in Mombasa terminated, the
Postmaster General has decided that he cannot be offered
further employment in the Imperial Post Office.

The Postmaster General has learnt with regret of the
refusal of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury
to award Mr. Holt a pension. He rendered satisfactory
service for 20 years; and his intemperate habits may, it is
thought, be fairly attributed to some extent to the unhealthy
climate of Mombasa and to the fact that, as stated by
Sir C. Eliot, he was exposed to exceptional temptations.

The Postmaster General recognises that, in the absence
of a Medical Certificate of permanent incapacity or of a
certificate of inability to discharge efficiently the duties
of his office, a pension cannot be granted to Mr. Holt; but
Mr. Secretary of State,

on the ground that his failings render it impossible to offer him further employment, such a certificate might be obtainable.

In view of the information now furnished as to the impossibility of employing Mr. Watt in the Imperial Post Office Service, Mr. Secretary Lytton may be disposed to make a further presentation on the subject to the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury.
