Sir.

We have the honour to submit the following extract from a letter from Messrs. Gray, Eaves & Company, received by last mail, viz:-

" Referring to previous correspondence regarding the East African line, we now have the honour to inform you that the next sailing from here will be on the 27th January, 28th February, 2nd March, 6th April, 10th May and the 14th June, 1896. The date of the return sailing from Mombasa will be on the 27th January, 28th February, 2nd March, 6th April, 10th May and the 14th June. At the present time our sailing will be:-

" Wensleydale"	sailing	27th January
" Langdale"	28th February	
" Huddersdale"	2nd March	
" Swaledale"	6th April	
" Clydesdale"	10th May	

In arranging a time-table one important point to be considered is the delay at your port. The volume of cargo now secured for Mombasa and Kilindini is increasing rapidly and is likely to develop and to increase carryings to Zanzibar, Beira and Delagoa Bay. It is essential to reduce the time of voyage and the stay at your port will require to be curtailed."

It will be necessary for us to enter again into detail

with regard to the inadequate accommodation and want of facilities for the landing of cargo in Mombasa and the impossibility of really making any improvements owing to the unsuitability of the position of the Custom House there.

We would therefore again most respectfully urge that the question of making Kilindini the compulsory harbour for steamers should be faced without delay and that steps should be at once taken to provide the port with the necessary facilities etc., for handling cargo.
