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of the areas in which surveys have been
carried out could be covered by triangulation
and 150,000 also covered, round of which detailed
surveys are required. The portions covered should
already have been surveyed by local staff and licensed
Surveyors, but, owing to the inaccurate methods employed,
much will have to be redone. Topographical maps should,
I consider, be prepared simultaneously with the triangulation,
and should cover the same areas.

In this, except in very cases, the scale of
1:250,000 would be suitable.

For detailed surveys the scale 1:10,000 could
be most generally convenient, except in quarantine areas,
where I would recommend 1:5,000.

The portion coloured in light blue has already been
surveyed by the triangulated Network of the Boundary Commission.
The Surveyor of portions marked in dark blue would, I
consider, be best frightened, as many applications are
now received by the Surveyor General. There is one need
only be undertaken by the Surveyor General.

It is proposed to have the work done in stages.
