My Lord,

In obedience to the instructions contained in

a.g.o. Mr. Lyttelton's despatch No. 426 of September 22nd on the
245/65 subject of granting to the Agent General at Bombay for

the British Protectorates in Eastern Africa an extension
of his powers in connection with the leave of Indians, I
have the honour to submit the following report:-

In view regard to extensions of leave, I consider that
each case should be considered by the Head of the
Department concerned and I deprecate the giving of
absolute powers to Mr. Simon in this respect. At the
same time I am fully alive to the inconvenience which
may be caused to officials overstaying their leave through
no fault of their own, and in order to obviate this I

see no objection to authority being given to Mr. Simson
to issue advances in such cases, at his discretion,
sufficient to pay for the official's ~~ticket~~ and expenses.

Each case would be then considered on the arrival of the
official in Africa with a view to a refund if necessary.

3. The question of food allowances is a small one, and
except that it necessitates a slight increase in
expense, calls for no comment.

4. With regard to the question of passages via Aden,
the reason why these were not allowed formerly was also
owing to expense. Lately the Austrian Lloyd Company
has issued tickets via Aden at the same rate as direct
passages from Bombay by the British India and German
Boats and passages have been granted accordingly.
Provided that Your Lordship sees no objection to the
additional expense, there is no reason why passages via
Aden should not be granted by any line.
