352. They stated that they thought the KAWILOH would not move out of TIPPERETT as long as they had unharvested crops.

354. Lieut. WILSON reports that though the natives in the neighbourhood of the post at KIPWANGO are nervous on the sight of patrols has been able to induce a number of them to come in to the post who are ready, on receipt of orders to that effect, to concentrate at KAWI TIPPI prior to moving into the Reserve.

355. They have asked for permission, after entering the Reserve, to return to their country to harvest their crops. Their proposal meets WILSON's objection.

361. Moving party of cattle was observed on the 4th inst.

KAMALIA.

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362. On the 4th inst. a patrol E. to SOMETHING's road and  
then S.E. towards RAVINE discovered a herd of  
cattle grazing in the forest and some shacks  
where people had been hiding. Huts were found to be  
deserted and indications noted that the inhabitants  
were living in the forest.

At 9 p.m. on the 4th instant the armed natives were  
discovered creeping up to the road suddenly with the  
intention of sniping with arrows.

MOSTIN notes that he is strongly of opinion that  
most of the NARDI made to move and that all the  
people seem to have been driven toward the MAU &  
MIGET forests while the surrounding country is des-  
erted. He has found many newly built grain stores  
and is of opinion that a considerable amount of grain  
is being hidden in the forests and savay.

363. G.C. KIRK reports that several French natives who  
came into his post to-day state that though TOROKE has  
told them to go into the Reserve they do not intend  
to listen to him.

ARAB NANGO and his family have camped close to the post and are ready to go into the Reserve at once but his tribe refuses to accompany him. Many of them have hidden in the forest and some have recently built huts close to its edge. 200

368. C.C.ALAGADIT reports that two KAMELILLO, ARAB CHERAGON & ARAB SIMEA have arrived in the Reserve with 17 head of cattle. They state that the KAMELILLO have no intention of moving.

369. C.C.SILE reports that patrols from that post between the 30th December and the 7th January have ascertained that all ARAB OZAMBOUGH's people and stock have hidden in the KAN Forest between SILE & USON which is full of cattle tracks.

370. He reports that Chief TONGUE is showing up very badly though his people prefer to be ready to move into the Reserve.

371. Capt. MAGLEBY reports that when patrolling N. from SIME on the 5th inst. he noticed numerous tracks of cattle leaving N. which were made after the last rain on the 28th November.

Operation Orders by Lieutenant-Colonel R.G. MARRISON, D.S.O.

Intelligence.

1. The greater part of the BANDE living N. of the line ALAGARIEN - KASSIKOM - KARIE PONG, especially the KAMERLE & KAPCHIKENDI ( or KAPCHIKEND ) tribes, are unwilling to move into the Reserve. Members of the two named tribes are hiding in the MAU forest between the lines KOBOKI - USOM & RAVINE - LONDIAKE while others have sought refuge in the forests covering the TIMIVINE range. Intelligence has been received from native sources indicating an intention on the part of some of the KAMERLE of moving into KIBWE.

2. It is the Commanding Officer's intention to force the KAPCHIKENDI & KAMERLE tribes into the Reserve near ALAGARIEN by depriving them of all means of subsistence or shelter in the MAU forest or KAMERLE country which end will be attained by the systematic and complete devastation of these districts by a series of strong patrols working from a chain of nine companies deployed on the line RAVINE - LONDIAKE - KIBWE - KIBWE.

Other tribes such as the KAPKOK, KEPKETAK ( or KAPALAK ) &c. will be permitted to join their fellow tribesmen long settled in various parts of the Reserve. The KAPCHIKENDI country will not be devastated without further orders.

3. The following Companies, forming the right wing of the driving line, under command of Lieutenant-Colonel COOMBS, D.S.O. 1st K.A.R. will, on the 20th instant, operate from the points named, towards the line KIBWE - USOM ( or LOMA ) -

The Capt. No 1 Day 3rd K.A.R. will provide guards for the protection of settlers in the neighbourhood of KISHAK, making KISHAK Station his headquarters, where he will keep a half Company concentrated to act as a support to the driving line. He will receive orders direct from Field Force Headquarters & will not come under the orders of the G.C. L. of G.

(a) Every maintenance and road cutting gang and Station between KISHAK and the 400 feet a guard of 1 rifleman each will file reports of 3 rifles for his company.

(b) That each ballast train has an escort of 5 riflemen.

(c) That the mukadar's hut at 810 is held by a party of 5 riflemen.

- (4) That the stock of grain for the settlers in the valley has a quantity of 300 bushels.

(4) That the line ~~driving~~ ~~driven~~ is constantly patrolled by strong patrols from KÖNIGSLY.

The balance of the L or S troops will re-enforce the guards on settlers at KÖNIGSLY & FORT THOMAS.

One hundred and fifty loads of grain will be put into KÖNIGSLY on the 16th instant.

Lieut BURKH with 30 rifles of No XIII Coy, 3rd L.A.R. will hold KÖNIGSLY.

One hundred and fifty loads of grain will be put into KÖNIGSLY on the 16th instant.

Lieut HEDDLE, 1st Regt. with 25 rifles of No 2 Coy 3rd L.A.R. will hold KÖNIGSLY.

Companies forming part of the driving line will carry 6 days grub on the person and 6 extra portions. Three days meat ration will be driven with each company. A reserve supply of 100 loads of grain will be stored at KÖNIGSLY, FORT THOMAS & LINDENFELD stations.

Scale of transport as laid down in No. 2 of 22/Mar.

One hundred and fifty pounds per rifle will be carried in pouches. Two boxes of ammunition will be taken with each company as company reserve.

The P.M.G. will detail a No. 6. to each wing of the driving line and will furnish every company with a provision of arms and dressings for three weeks operations.

Officers Commanding wings will arrange to collect all prisoners taken and forward them to the P. G. at ALBRECHT as opportunity offers.

The Signalling Officer will provide every company operating with a signalling officer.

Every effort will be made to maintain communication between the various stations or the driving line.

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The supply nature of the country will necessitate  
certain arrangements to be made and being made by every  
Company Commander to suit local conditions.

When offensive Commanding wings are satisfied that the  
areas assigned to them for their operations are ab-  
solutely cleared of the enemy, his huts and his food &  
supplies, they will report the fact to Headquarters  
and await further orders before entering KARACHIKHAN.

Headquarters remained at MUNQONI.  
Reports received from various sources point conclusively to the fact that the movement westward from KAMULILLO is not a migration of that tribe into ALDAI. Intelligence reported shows that some KAMPOON and KAMULILLO have joined their fellow tribesmen in ALDAI while the main cattle tracks leading W. from KAMULILLO were made by stock driven along the ESCARPMENT foot hills to salt licks in the NYANDO valley near MARKS BOOM.

Headquarters remained at MUNQONI.  
The ALDAI & LAITONGWA's people (KAPUMOTES) have offered to assist government in pushing the KAMULILLO towards ALAGABEYA.

The situation is now sufficiently cleared up to enable operation orders for the forcible removal into the Reserve of the tribes now living east of it.

Unfortunately the detention at MUNQONI as members of or witnesses before the Court of Inquiry now sitting of a number of prisoners whose presence with their companies in essential in any operations is impeding the movement of troops.

January: Draft orders for operations against the KAPUMOTES & KAMULILLO have been prepared but until the Court of Inquiry is over which date is as yet uncertain owing to the number of witnesses still to be examined they cannot be issued.

The Commanding Officer's intention is to hold the railway with 1 of 3 troops & guard the station at KALO with 1 Company while exploring & conducting a devastating war against KAMULILLO & KAPUMOTE countries. These Cos. will be divided in two groups, viz 4 Cos. at approximately 5 m. intervals along the RAVIND-LONDIAH road while 5 Companies are deployed on the line N.W. of KALO station. The first group will have 1 Cos.

the dense MAU forest into which some KAMILLI & KAP-GIMMIDI have taken refuge - this it will work out by patrols based on the RAVINE-LORDLANT road. The stated group will devastate the KAMILLI Country. When the area within patrolling radius of companies is absolutely cleared of inhabitants & has been swept of all means of subsisting or sheltering refugees the line of companies will be moved forward to new positions & the process repeated until all the tribesmen have gone into the prairie & the country S. of it is uninhabitable.

Food has been bought in WINONDO & collected in the ~~area~~ for refugees fleeing north in front of our line of patrols.

It is hoped that when this MAU fled that they are doing well in the Benyera valley. If so, which it is we tollerble they will take the best of the situation & settle down quickly in their old locations.

JANUARY: Headquarters remains at LEMONDY.

Arrangements made for the provisioning of WINONDO & ENT POKO as ration depots for the use of the advancing line in the future clearing operations.

JANUARY: Operations centre issued for clearing of the forest comprised between the KAMALILO, KARANGA & LONDJANT - RAVENS and of the KAMALILO territory, owing to delay caused by uncertainty as to the date on which the Court of Enquiry would conclude its labours it has been impossible to issue orders sooner, to ensure all Companies employed being at their starting points for the drive six days MUST be allowed between the issue of orders, which have to be forwarded by uncertain MAIL runners to our various scattered posts, and the inception of the drive. It will thus be necessary to begin operations before the 19th January.

The Court of Enquiry will be ready.

Headquarters moved to LONDJANT Station.

JANUARY: Headquarters will remain at LONDJANT during operations in the MAU and KAMALILO. The position of LONDJANT, which is a "mail line" telegraph station is well suited for promptly receiving reports both from the wings of the force operating in MAU and from their clearing partners KAMALILO.
