- (b) That a lot of cattle which have been reported as moving to ALDAI are ALDAI cattle which were moved into KAMELILO when the ALDAI were alarmed by Major WALKER's operations in NYANGORI.

337. Lieut. WILSON on patrol reports from HAPES BOHA that he has observed no tracks fresher than 5 days old and that the natives living on the RESERVEMENT informed him that some days ago some KAMELILO had gone to ALDAI but that the ALDAI people having refused to harbour them they had returned to KAMELILO.

338. The Collector KERRIGAN reports that on the 5th Decr. a KAMELILO NIMORAN named ARAN TING, who is still at large, with the help of 3 LIMBUA murdered a KAVIRONDE at KHEMUNG.

In January: 339. G.C. M.M.B. reports that every chief and probably every family of the KAMELILO, KAPCHUMBI, KAPCHUMBI-LAM & KAPCHUMBI clans have been warned of M.M.B.'s Commissioner's orders to be in the Reserve by the 15th inst. and of the consequences which will follow non compliance.

340. Every opportunity has been given the KAMELILO to move without discomfort to themselves: they have however made no attempt to obey orders.

A herd of cattle was observed on the 1st inst. heading out on towards TIVIMBU from the direction of

359. On the 1st inst. a patrol H. to SOASTER's road and then on towards RAVINE discovered 22 head of cattle grazing in the forest and some shelters where they had been hiding. Huts were found to be deserted and indications noted that the inhabitants were hiding in the forests.

At 9 p.m. on the 4th inst. two armed natives were discovered creeping up to the post surreptitiously with the intention of sniping with arrows.

POSTIN notes that he is strongly of opinion that a few of the NARDI mean to move and that all the others seem to have been driven towards the MAU & WAKET forests while the surrounding country is deserted. He has found many newly built grain stores and is of opinion that a considerable amount of grain is being hidden in the forests and caves.

362. O.C. SNEY FARAY reports that several forest natives who came into his post to-day state that though TORORE has told them to go into the Reserve they do not intend to listen to him.

363. O.C. ALARPIET reports that 1 FANELILO with two women and 10 head of cattle have reached the Reserve.

364. O.C. USON reports that ANAN COMPUSON tried to go to the Reserve but was beaten by members of his tribe.

- Intelligence. 1. The greater part of the HANU living N. of the line ALAGABIN - KASIKAK - HANU FORT, especially the KAMELIS & KASCHIKWENDI (or KAKIKWENDI) tribes, are unwilling to move into the Reserve. Members of the two named tribes are hiding in the MAN forest between the lines KINWONI - USUN & RAVINE - LONDANI while others have sought refuge in the forests covering the TIMIFFWE range. Intelligence has been received from native sources indicating an intention on the part of some of the KAMELIS of moving into HEROCHI.
- Intelligence. 2. It is the Commanding Officer's intention to force the KASCHIKWENDI & KAMELIS tribes into the Reserve near ALAGABIN by depriving them of all means of subsistence or shelter in the MAN forest or KAMELIS country, which end will be attained by the systematic and complete denudation of these districts by a series of strong patrols working from a chain of main companies deployed on the line RAVINE - LONDANI - KINWONI - USUN.
- Minor tribes such as the KAKIKWENDI, KAKIKWENDI (or KAKIKWENDI) &c. will be permitted to join their fellow clansmen long settled in various parts of the Reserve. The KASCHIKWENDI country will not be denuded without further orders.
- Operations. 3. The following Companies, forming the right wing of the driving line, under Command of Lieut-Colonel GORING, D.S.O. 1st K.A.F. will, on the 27th instant, operate from the points named, towards the line KINWONI - USUN (or USUN) -

 - Companies forming part of the driving line will carry 3 days' grain on the persons and 3 on porters. Three days' salt ration will be driven with each company. A reserve supply of 100 loads of grain will be stored at KARAKUM, FORT KARAKUM & KARAKUM.
 9. Scale of transport as laid down in No. 2 of the order.
 10. One hundred and fifty rounds per rifle will be carried in pouches. Two boxes of ammunition will be taken with each company as company reserve.
 11. The P.M.O. will detail a N.C.O. to each wing of the driving line and will furnish every company with a sufficiency of drugs and dressings for three weeks' operations.
 12. Officers commanding wings will arrange to collect all prisoners taken and forward them to the P. O. at KARAKUM as opportunity offers.
 13. The Signalling Officer will provide every company operating with a signalling code. Every effort will be made to maintain communication between the different wings of the driving line.

the sweeping nature of the country will necessitate special arrangements to their end being made by every Company Commander to suit local conditions. When Officers Commanding wings are satisfied that the areas assigned to them for their operations are absolutely cleared of the enemy, his huts and his food supplies, they will report the fact to Headquarters and await further orders before entering KASCHENKINDI.

January: Headquarters remained at MUMORONI.
Reports received from various sources point conclusively to the fact that the movement westward from KAMELLO is not a migration of that tribe into ALDAI. Intelligence reported shows that some KAKIPOOH and KAKIPIKOH have joined their fellow tribesmen in ALDAI while the main cattle tracks leading W. from KAMELLO were made by stock driven along the BSOAK-
MONT foot hills to salt licks in the NYANDO valley near MARKS HALL.

January: Headquarters remained at MUMORONI.
The ALDAI & LATONGWA's people (KAPUKOIS) have offered to assist Government in pushing the KAMELLO towards ALAGAHIA.
The situation is now sufficiently cleared up to enable operation orders for the forcible removal into the reserve of the tribes now living east of it. Unfortunately the detention at MUMORONI as members of or witnesses before the Court of Enquiry now sitting of a number of officers whose presence with their companies is essential in any operations is hampered the movement of troops.

January: Draft orders for operations against the KAPUKOIS & KAMELLO have been prepared but until the Court of Enquiry is over which date is as yet uncertain owing to the number of witnesses still to be examined they cannot be issued.
The Commanding Officer's intention is to hold the railway with 1 of 3 troops & guard the settlement at MULO with 1 Company while exploring & operating to devastate the KAMELLO & KAPUKOIS countries. These Coy. will be based in the grounds, via 4 Coy. at approximately 5 m. intervals along the RAVINA-LONDIAH road while 5 Companies are deployed on the line from MULO station. The first column will leave MULO

the dense MAU forest into which some KAMUJALO & KAPA
CHUMUNDI have taken refuge-this it will work out
by patrols based on the RAVINE-LORDIANI road. The
stated group will devastate the KAMUJALO country.
When the area within patrolling radius of companies
is ~~completely~~ cleared of inhabitants & has been swept
of all means of subsisting or collecting refugees the
line of companies will be pushed forward to new posi-
tions & the process repeated until all the tribesmen
have gone into the preserve & the country is
renonhabitable.

Food has been bought in KATHONDO & collected in the
preserve for refugees flying over in event of an
invasion.

It is hoped that when the MAU find that they are
done well in the preserve while life outside it is un-
tolerable they will take the best of the situation
& settle down quietly in their own localities.

January: Headquarters remained at LAMONOKI.

Arrangements made for the provisioning of KAPALI &
KAT BAKI as ration depots for the use of the divi-
sion line in the future during operations.

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January: Operations ceased for a period of the forest comprised between the hills KANGA and LORDIANS - RAVINE and of the ing to delay caused by uncertainty as to the date on which the Court of Enquiry would commence its labours it has been impossible to issue orders sooner. To ensure all Companies employed being at their starting points for the drive six days must be allowed between the issue of orders, which have to be forwarded by uncertain MAIL runners to our various scattered posts, and the inception of the drive. It will thus be necessary to begin operations before the 19th January. The Court of Enquiry closed to-day. Headquarters moved to LORDIANS Station.

January: Headquarters will remain at LORDIANS Station operations in the MAU and KASSELLO. The position of LORDIANS, which is a "main line" telegraph station is well suited for promptly receiving reports both from the wings of the force operating in MAU and from that clearing KANGA & KASSELLO.
