With reference to my despatch No. 147 of March 28th in which I reported a fresh outbreak of African Coast Fever in an area near Nairobi, I have the honour to inform your Lordship that the Chief Veterinary Officer recently called my attention to the fact that no offence under the Diseases of Animals Ordinance, 1906, and no breach of a rule, proclamation, order or direction under the said Ordinance was cognizable by the Police. As it was impossible for the Veterinary Department to enforce their Regulations unless the Police had certain powers conferred upon them, I have caused an Amendment of the Diseases of Animals

Sir,

With reference to the telegram of today's date from the Chief Veterinary Officer requesting that power may be given to the Police to arrest without a warrant persons committing offences against the Diseases of Animals Ordinance 1906, I have the honour to advise that the Police should be empowered to arrest without a warrant natives and other persons who cannot easily be followed, if they be found committing an offence against the Ordinance, and that in all cases the Police should be able to detain any animal if they have reason to suspect that it is being removed from any place or district in contravention of any of the provisions of or under the Ordinance.

- 2. I send herewith a draft Ordinance giving effect to this recommendation which if approved, should, I think, be published in the next issue of the Gazette.
