I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of

Your Lordship's letter of No. 11 of March 6th informing
me of the conditions on which Mr. B. Thomson was appointed
Assistant in the East Africa Protectorate Customs.

In reply to the last paragraph I have the honor
to request that an Officer may be appointed from the
Customs House to replace Mr. Williamson who has
intimated his willingness to continue in the service of
the East Africa Protectorate until the arrival of his
successor.

With regard to the terms of this appointment
I am not in favour of a one year's agreement, involving

Principal Secretary of State

for the Colonies,

Downing Street,

L O N D O N, S.W.

as it does the payment by the Government of passages from
and to England, and I have the honour to recommend that
Mr. Thomson's successor be called upon to enter into an
agreement for two and a half years. I should have no
objection to six months' leave being granted at the
expiration of this term of service whether the agreement
is renewed or not.
