The humble petition of the undersigned residents and subjects in British East Africa Sheweth

That your petitioners regret that the Imperial Government have disregarded the previous remonstrances made by them in regard to the proposed Zionist settlement in British East Africa

3. That now that the scheme for the settlement of aliens in a British country has gone so far that a deputation has come to East Africa to report on the nature of the lands to be allotted your petitioners wish again to protest with all their strength against the proposal to hand over any part of the country to aliens

Your petitioners consider it unjust that British subjects should only be allowed to purchase or lease land on condition of showing capital or on payment of purchase money and fees while aliens are to be given a grant of some of the best land in British East Africa suited for European colonisation not only without showing capital but without making any payments in respect thereof

4. Your petitioners consider that as the Uganda Railway has been constructed and the East Africa Protectorate supported at the expense of the British taxpayer, British subjects should have a preferential claim over any aliens to the land rendered available for settlement by such expenditure.

5. Your petitioners submit that if aliens are to be granted land in British East Africa, it should be only on the same conditions as to British subjects, or at all events on not more favourable ones

6. Your petitioners consider that the method of the proposed settlement by creating an imperium in imperio is particularly inadvisable as South Africa's experience has shown the dangerous danger and the effects of such a system which arise from setting up so called subdominions and autonomous governments within the limits of British sovereignty

7. Your petitioners further deprecate the introduction into British East Africa of the class of aliens whom it is proposed shall be sent there—a class not likely to become agricultural or to remain on the land. Their natural bent is trading and their presence among savage tribes is likely to have a demoralising effect, and to lead to trouble and bloodshed, which in all probability will render necessary the armed interference of your petitioners and other white settlers to quell

8. Your petitioners submit that if any land is reserved for free white settlement in British East Africa it should in justice to the tax-payers of Great Britain and Ireland be allotted to the million paupers now in the workhouses of the United Kingdom, instead of to the surplus population of foreign countries. Your petitioners therefore pray that His Majesty's Government will be pleased to give it earnest consideration to the above petitions to the proposed settlement.
