Mr. ~~Adams~~ informed the last Officer-in-Charge

I have consulted Mr. Cowe as to
this. He said that the F.O. view of the
power of deportation was that it should
only be exercised in very rare cases
and only after the fullest consideration
of the facts and any arrangement with
the authorities of the place to which a
man is deported.

We expressed astonishment at the
indication of wholesale deportation
contained in his telegram, and
invited him to advise us in any way
without any information as to the
circumstances. He suggested that
we should ask for a full report by
mail.
