

Some urine and vomited matter mixed were shown me but there was nothing suggestive of B. W. Fever then.

He was given 10 grs of Quinine which he retained - and as he made such a noise and tossed about so, he was never again given Calarsdyns M. xv. chiefly at his own request as he was convinced that it would cure him.

It certainly did him good for he became quiet, said his pain was less and he felt much better.

The German Physician of the J.S.C. left to watch him and send for me if any pain or vomiting occurred.

28th. 8 A.M.

Says he has no pain but the pain is better and that he did not vomit yesterday night. Said he took milk and soda.

He looked very well but his wings had been thrown away. His plumage though it looked dark but there seemed to be the usual bright possibly a little less. Big boy said that what he knew away was very dark - but was mixed with white.

Amitted to Hospital 8 A.M.

8.30. Very nervous and almost hysterical. Cutaneous sensibility so great that no examination can be made. Vomited once.

9.30. Much quieter and says he has no pain and the cutaneous sensibility is much less. Spleen can be felt and enlarged but no tenderness. Bowels open, loose yellow - a few drops of urine in bedpan undoubtedly Haemoglobinuria. Distinctly jaundiced vomited twice

No vomiting since 9.30. has retained a fair amount of milk. Jaundice increasing no urine passed since 9.30.

5. p.m.

Vomited a little bile (yellow) passed about 1 oz of typical blackwater urine - very nervous about himself, says he is tired and wants to sleep.

T. 98.6 Pulse 94. Jaundice deeper.

6. p.m.

Very restless, throwing himself about, refuses to keep his blankets on, talking at random and inclined to be astreptopneus. Complains of pain but won't say where it is, continues to ask for something to stop his pain.

Morphine: Hypoderm: gr. 1/6.

Much quieter at once and continued so until 8.30.

8.30

Has had no vomiting since 5 p.m., and has retained milk and soda. Jaundice deeper no other change.

T. 98.4. rather talkative, pulse not so good.

12

Midnight - Pulse weaker - semi-delirious - not certain where he is, and rambling of West Coast.

Brandy

5.30.

Pulse 124. weak, quieter - still retaining milk; desiring occasionally.

7 a.m.

T. 97.8 pulse 124. a little stronger - jaundice deeper, talks of West Coast to himself but answers rationally. If left alone mutters to himself.

11.

No change - sweating slightly - no urine.

(Dr Wiggins consultation)

As before T. 96 in axilla. P. 108 getting weaker.

Retching - felt he wanted to pass urine but failed.

Says he feels sick - retched once or twice but no actual vomiting - still retained milk & soda - pulse weaker. Champagne - pulse improved.

P. 106 - irregular - skin cold - clammy - Eyes dull - Champagne - Hot water bottles.

No change.

9.30 p.m.

P. 108 irregular - passed  $\frac{1}{2}$  very dark urine

After large quantities of whisky - reflected milk-taking  
troublous & champaigne occasionally, swallowing diffi-  
culty, very cold &寒氣, not improved by coffee.  
Minimal use of hotwater bottles.

Skin edematous - no pain.

Says he feels much better.

Champagne - (very continued).

From this point until he died his pains became  
weaker & weaker & more irregular. He was very  
quiet at times, but occasionally he opened his  
eyes. If spoken to he replied that he was very tired  
and wanted to go to sleep and he practically died in  
his sleep with no pain or struggle.

Mr. Cook had, prior to coming to  
South Africa, resided for 2 years  
in West Africa, 4 years in Egypt,  
as far as South Africa, and  
had suffered a good deal from  
tuberculosis. His general physique  
was very poor. There was  
tubercular disease in one of  
his lungs; enlarged liver  
and spleen; and incipient  
diabetes.
