I have had the honour to receive your despatch No. 281
of June 23rd, regarding the grant of land to Mr. Chamberlain
at Nakuru.

As I have already reported to you, I had many interviews
with both Mr. Allen, Mr. Chamberlain's solicitor, and with
Mr. Flemmer, and I was of opinion that both thoroughly
misunderstood the whole situation, I did not consider it
necessary to consider the question, Mr. Chamberlain having
offered some difficulties. The mere fact of his taking
possession of the land seemed to me to close the incident, and
I did not wish to stir up the controversy over again. Besides
that, he had written to me in his letters in such abusive
and scurrilous language, I was of opinion that he deserved no
consideration. I regret, however, that I did not give him
