



Sir,

We have the honour to inform you that we held a Board of Survey on the Treasury Cash on the 3rd instant (Cash in the hands of the Treasury Cashier) and the 5th instant (copper in the Fort Strong Rooms).

Owing to the fact that a Board of Inquiry was engaged in investigating the recent theft from the Fort Strong Rooms, and uncertainty as to the scope of our survey pending the completion of the inquiry, we did not survey the closing balance of the December Quarter, but took that of the 2nd January 1906.

256 boxes said to each contain Rs.100 worth of new copper pice from the Mint, not in circulation = Rs.25600.

With the exception of the copper in the entrance passage cell (from the Strong Room which fell into ruins in March 1905, and considered as the equivalent of 75 boxes said to contain Rs.100 worth each), the seals on which (Treasury and Audit) were intact, we counted all the boxes of copper in the Fort Strong Rooms. We did not however verify their contents.

The Rs.17-12-/- in copper, the remains of the rifle boxes, were removed from the Fort to the Treasury.
