Mr.Zuzarte, had frequently to be left in sole
charge of the Station; he therefore had every
opportunity of making away with the ammunition.
Mr.Zuzarte had not a good reputation himself; he
was on intimate terms with low-class traders who

on a former agoasion seen burying ammunition. On the store of one of these men; and the ammunition found in maramojo has been traced from the direction of Baringo, whence it could only have been transported by pack-donkeys owned by one of the traders.

3. Although the case which was brought against Mr. Zugarte fell through owing to want of evidence, and the departmental enquiry which was subsequently held failed to edicit direct areas of his guilt. I am of opinion that there is no doubt that Mr. Zurarte was connected with the theft: and as I omsidered it a dangerous precedent to allow him to remain in devernment employ; I instructed the Treasurer to grant him such leave and leave pay as were due to him and to inform him that at the expiration of his leave his services would no longer be required. I regret that the grounds for dismissel were not given to Mr. Augurte in accordance with Colonial Legulation Vo. 96. As Mr. Zugarte was engaged locally on a monthly salary and his services might at any time have been dispensed with at a month's notice, I was of opinion that he was wing very leniently dealt with.

It should also be mentioned that as a result of other troubles at Baringo some three years ago Mr. Zuzarte the dismissal was recommonded by then Assistant Collector and supported by the late Sul-Commissioner of the Trovince, Mr. Bagge; but owing to a representation from the Treasury shewing the great difficulty at that time of securing suitable clerks up country the matter was eventually dropped.
