Colonial Office,
LONDON, S.W.

Sir,

I purpose proceeding to British East Africa as soon as possible; and I desire to know before I start if it will be agreeable to you to grant me say three plots of land of one thousand acres each, with an option to the surrounding nine thousand acres, near Kilifi, Lamu, and between Wang'a and Taveta. My object in asking this favour is to avoid the loss of time caused by the application being sent to England for confirmation after I have selected and marked out the lands. I purpose being on one plot, and having two competent white men from Ceylon on the others.

I trust you will see your way to show me a little consideration in this matter as one of the pioneers of the Protectorate, and as I have, by my advice, writings, time and money expended, been, to a certain degree, instrumental in its advancement, may I ask for a reply in a day or two?
