Sir,

With reference to the matter of the new postage stamps which it will be necessary to provide for use in the East Africa & Uganda Protectorates in connection with the alteration of the subsidiary coinage, I have the honour to inform you that I consider it desirable that stamps of the values of 12 cents and 75 cents should be added to those mentioned in the Colonial Office despatch of the 30th of July last. A stamp of 12 cents would take the place of the present 2 anna stamp, whilst the value of 75 cents (the equivalent of a shilling) is required for the adjustment of charges framed on that basis. e.g. those of the inland and United Kingdom parcel post. The adoption of these proposals would have the effect of making the new issue consist of 9 stamps as follows:-
1c. 3c. 6c. 12c. 15c. 25c. 50c. and 75c.

In the case of Ceylon there are 10 stamps below the rupee value.

The question of a 1 cent stamp is one which I should like to discuss with the Crown Agents for the Colonies before a decision is arrived at.

Such a stamp would have obvious uses in the adjustment of charges upon correspondence to which a

portion of the postage may have been attached before being weighed at the Post Office, and it is

possible that if it were not provided the public might, in some cases, be practically compelled to

affix more than the recognised charge. At the

same time it is noted that in the case of Ceylon

there is no stamp of less value than 2 cents. The

question seems to hinge upon the relation between

the cost of printing the stamps and their face

value. I am afraid that a 1 cent stamp is an effective means of collecting revenue.

Certain suggestions of the Crown Agents in regard to alterations in the printing of the
