MADRAS, 29th April 1907.

Dear Sirs,

To make Port Florence as suggested in Measure
would be, I suppose, a letter of 20-25 miles received
under Colonial Office despatch No. 96 of 21st February
last involving the construction or the question of ex-
tending the railway road the north end of the Victoria
Span to Gopalpur.

This estimate will certainly be made in time
and must be anticipated when new ports are being opened
on the north shore of the lake.

a. As far as is at present known there is no
suitable deep water port on the northern half of the
lake. It is doubtful whether it would be politic
to name it the temporary terminus of the railway owing
that the whole of the lake is shallow and that the port
would have to be situated off the direct route to Jhunjhunu.

Port Victoria is the furthest it is known the
most eligible site but even that is rather doubtful
owing that the railway will have to pass north of
Swami Jay.

b. We have already spent a considerable amount
of money in port Florence and our present planers

are therefore,

and although I am fully impressed with the Consulting Engineers in considering that greater efficiency can be obtained by using steamers of greater draft than our present boats and that we should aim at acquiring a port with sufficient depth of water to allow this to be done, I am of the opinion that, having regard to the Capital outlay that would be required to move Port Florence and the impossibility of getting the money, it is premature to consider the matter.

4. I propose, as opportunity offers, to have the whole north shore from Port Florence to Bullock Bay carefully examined so that when the question of extension of the railway comes up we shall be in a position to say definitely which is the best site for a deep water port if such is required on that shore.
