THE GOVERNOR OF THE EAST AFRICA PROTECTORATE TO THE SECRETARY OF STATE  
FOR THE COLONIES.

(Received by Colonial Office 1.34 p.m. 22d May, 1907.)

Dear Lordship's colleague of the day: Violation of legal status of slavery can be compensated out of amount of compensation estimated at \$40,000, but \$100,000; but it is difficult to forecast adequately and I may have to pay half the amount within 12 months after abolition. It is true that East African Government has only paid \$20,000 compensation but conditions there were very different and it is very probable that varied opportunities here would tempt small proportion of slaves into go away from their masters or strengthen of statutory freedom. Abolition may possibly cause considerable damage to crops and great loss slaves whose final result might be a capitol to grant temporary protection of sensitive in such case in the event of large exodus.

I am directed by the Earl of Higham to request  
you to inform the Lord Commissioners of the Treasury  
that he desires, after consultation with the Secretary  
of State for Foreign Affairs, to give effect without  
further delay to the policy of abolishing the legal  
status of slavery in the mainland dominions of the Sultan  
of Zanzibar, which form part of the East Africa Pro-  
tectorate.

2. His Majesty's Government have pledged them-  
selves to carry out this policy as soon as possible,  
and the only difficulty is with regard to the expense,  
the amount of which cannot at present be estimated with  
any accuracy. It is probable that a certain number  
of slaves would leave their masters on the strength of  
their statutory freedom, and it would be necessary that  
the masters should be compensated.

3. In these circumstances it appears to Lord  
Higham to be desirable to take steps at once for the  
investigation of the financial side of the question,  
and he would suggest that a special Commission would  
be appointed, consisting of the Joint Commissioners of the  
Lord Commissioners and the Secretary of State, or  
the Secretary of State with their Lordships' concurrence.
