on receipt of the telegram referred to, I'at once proceeded to majrabl and was very pleaned to find on arrivel that Mr. Oliver, the acting Postmater, had been both cook headed and extremely energetic in appl the valuables and general effects of his Office; which hed ofterwards doe'lt wary promptly and capably with the eituation created by the burning of the building. his efforts, and with the shie sesistance of the efficials of the Tolograph Construction and Maintenance Department Post and Tolegreph business was resumed within 2 of the mediacry time of aporting of the Office.

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The Post Office building was the property of the idministration, having been purchesed from the late Mrs. Boustead: it was intended to be used on completion of the new Office as ougetern for European clerks and in this respect it would appear that some provision will be necessary in the astimates for the ensuing financial year In regard to the registered and other letters in the Office at the time, and the Office records, apparently everything was saved: it is possible that a few erticles may have been overlooked but acthing had been found missing up to the time of my leaving Metrobio. Between the hours of 2 and 3 a.m., I was aroused by the aplosion of cartridges and the blowing of askaries whistles nd on looking out of the window noticed the glare of a large five n the immediat vicinity. I dressed and going into the street ound that Payne's Hotel was on fire. I watched the progress I the fire until the hatel was completely destroyed and the dincent building had become ignited. Then I found that there. es no hope of this building being saved and that the direction he wind was blowing made it very evident that the fire would bread I decided that it was advisable to remove the valuables nd letters from the Post Office. I gathered the staff residing n the premises and desputched an urgent note to the Sub- Comassioner informing him briefly of the state of affairs and of hat I intended to do and asked for assistance to remove and guard he contents of the office. I then instructed the clerks in erge of valuables to attend to their safes and drawers and move all cash, stamps, registered letters etc. . This was done d the collection of valuables put into three or four bags which re sealed and placed in the carriers of the sub-Comissioner he had arrived) and an exced guard stand over these. This as den thought, albeed all velocities in suit keeping and the tention of the staff was turned to latters, record, talegraphstruments etc. These, with the mestriches of mon samplied by Mb-Commissioner, were per oved and as there was no hope of

By this time practically every-thing had been removed but unfortunately in the hurry in which it was done several articles of furniture were damaged. Then it was impossible to do anything further in the building a move was made to gollect and arrange records etc., which were scattered about. This this was being done I found that the bag containing the counter clock of the man described stock of stemps and stemp cash was lying securious electrons the bags of papers, etationery, etc., I had the man placed in a safe, the keys of which I retained.

Memorandum of agreement made this sixth day of September Mineteen hundred and five between Richard George Bland (of the Stores Department Uganda Railway), I Mackey (Centein 3rd Kings African Rifles) and Radford (Medical Officer at Nairobi) being respectively the Worshipful Master, and the two Wardens of the Lodge Harmony (Nairobi) of the Society of Freemasons, hereinafter called the Lessors of the one part. and John Thomas Goaling, Postmaster General of East Africa and Uranda Protectorates, hereinafter called the Lessee of the other part, "itnesseth:-The Lessors being tenants of the building known as the Masonic Hall situated in Victoria Street Nairobi, with the premises thereto attached, under an agreement with Mr. J.P. Bhedwar deted the 30th of June Nineteen hundred and five, and recistered at Number terminable on the Blat of ay Mineteen hundred and six, and having under the said a roement power to sublet, hereby agree to lease to the aforesaid Lessee the whole of the basement and out-houses of the aforesaid "asonic Hall for the period from the sixth of September Wineteen hundred and five until the 31st of May Nineteen hundred and six for a monthly rental of Rupees Fifty.

- 2. The Lessee agrees to rent the aforeseid premises for the aforeseid period and to pay therefor the said monthly rent of Rupees Fifty.
- 3. And it is further agreed that the said Lesses on tendering to the said Lesses one asymplete months matics or paying one menths rent in lieu of such notice shall have the right to terminate his tenancy of the said premises without paying any further compensation.
- 4. The said Lessee undertakes upon the termination of the

said tenancy to leave the said building and premises in the same condition as at the time when entered into by him, and any damage or alteration made in the course of adoption of the building for use as a temporary Post Office shall be made good by the said Lessee.
