Dear Sir,

It has been brought to notice by the Inspector General King's African Rifles that consequent on the reduction in strength of the 1st and 3rd Battalions King's African Rifles the establishment of Military Paymasters is considerably overstuffed and the question of reduction is one that requires attention.

The present strength and cost of this establishment is:-

... a saving of £ 385 but will leave 1 Paymaster and  
 Paymaster's Clerk unprovided for. This circumstance need  
 however cause no embarrassment as it gives us an opportunity  
 of dealing with a matter to which my attention has also been  
 directed. The Treasurer, a copy of whose Minute on this  
 subject I enclose, fully concurs in the Inspector's  
 suggestions for reduction and also draws attention to the  
 necessity for organizing without delay a proper system of  
 Police accounts. Of this I was fully aware and thoroughly  
 concurred in the proposal but it would in the ordinary course  
 of events have been compelled to stand over until next year's  
 estimates.

I have now the store of honour to recommend that the  
 Paymaster and Clerk who will thus be left unprovided for be  
 immediately transferred to the Police Department; their pay  
 will be borne on the Military Schedule till the end of the  
 present financial year and a proper system of Police accounts

can be commenced immediately. Mr. O. Lambie, the officer affected,  
 is at present Paymaster to the 1st Battalion King's African Rifles  
 and has submitted an application to be appointed Pay and Quarter  
 Master of the Police Force and as the Inspector General King's  
 African Rifles has a high opinion of his capacity I would recommend  
 him for the appointment.

I would therefore make the following proposals for Your  
 Lordship's consideration:-

(i) That the staff of the King's African Rifles Pay Department  
 be retrenched in accordance with the Inspector General's and the  
 Treasurer's recommendations.

(ii) That the Paymaster and Paymaster's Clerk who become  
 available by this retrenchment, be not transferred to the Police  
 Department but that they may be borne on the Military Schedule  
 till the end of the present financial year.

(iii) That due provision be made in the ensuing Police Estimates  
 for the continuance of these new appointments.

After carefully considering the matter I am of the opinion that the appointment of a Pay and Quartermaster with staff is not only desirable but necessary for the Police Department.

The reduction of both 1st and 3rd battalions of the King's African Rifles has undoubtedly left the Military Paymasters establishments considerably overstuffed and I consider Paymaster (Mr. A. Smith) and 2 Assistant Paymasters (Messrs. Stone and Cowasjee) ample.

This leaves Mr. Gamble unprovided for and I would recommend his transfer to the Police Department at his present scale of pay.

If, as is rumored, the 1st King's African Rifles is to be replaced when it returns to British Central Africa at the termination of its present term of service, one of the Assistant Paymasters could also be transferred to the Police. I would recommend Mr. Cowasjee to be transferred, leaving Messrs. Smith and Stone with the 3rd King's African Rifles.

In any event I would recommend the immediate transfer of Mr. Gamble (as soon as Colonial Office sanction has been obtained). His pay could still be borne on the Military schedule, but he could inaugurate a proper system of Police accounts to come into force on 1st April next.
