H.M.'s Secy of State for Foreign Affairs  
any slave sent by him under the preceding  
article and the proofs thereof to the  
Proceedings thereon" & I think  
that it would be well to add the  
attention of the Govt to the latter  
Article and to give the Native  
Court's a copy of the present  
order so that they can conform to the  
same by it will come to prevail in  
Africa very soon.
