

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My dear Riddick.

I was very glad to hear of your appointment to Southern Nigeria, though I wish for your sake you could have been given time in a better climate.

As you know I was most thoroughly satisfied with your excellent work as a Subaltern of the S. Leone Battalion of the W. A. F. F. and was very sorry that repeated attacks of blackwater fever caused the Doctors to say that your return there was most impracticable.

You had done so well when in command of a Company that had you been able to stay I should have recommended you for promotion.

As it was all I could do was to recommend you as a very deserving young Officer, whose health had broken down in a bad climate, for a appointment in a better one.

Unfortunately there happened to be no suitable vacancy available ~~xxxxxxxxx~~ & consequently you could only be offered an appointment in another part of West Africa.

There does not however seem to be any blackwater fever in S. Nigeria, and as you are a sensible & temperate fellow I hope that you will be able to stand the climate there.

If you do as well in civil employ as you did in the W. A. F. F. I feel sure that you will soon earn promotion as the experience you have already gained in W. Africa will be useful to you.
