My Lord,

With reference to Your Lordship's despatch No. 378 of the 4th ultimo respecting Captain J. C. Ward's appointment as Deputy Principal Registrar of Documents, I have the honour to enquire whether for purposes of leave and pension that appointment may be allowed to date from October 26th 1905 when he first assumed the duties of the post.

2. In any circumstances I would venture to urge in support of the proposal to count as leave the period during which he was in temporary employment, the inadvisability of keeping Europeans for too long a period in the tropics without leave. If Captain Ward's service only counts from April 1st last he will not be entitled to six months leave.

employed as an Assistant District Commissioner.


