Arbitration for Disputes.

McKenna Against a Naval Loan.

(Reuter's Special to "E. A. Standard.")
London.
Sir Edward Grey in replying to questions put by Lord Winterston said that Japan was aware of the views of Britain respecting the reference of international disputes to arbitration. It was quite undesirable, he said, to lay papers at this stage on anything which may have passed between the two Governments.

Mr. McKenna when he introduced the Naval estimates said "We hold that we must maintain a supreme navy, not merely for a year, but so long as the Empire lasts. He never would advise, he said, a loan for naval purposes, which was a temporary expedient to supply a permanent need. Exceptional circumstances, however, might arise in which an exceptional expedient might have to be adopted. He pointed out that the estimates for the highest point with reference to the laying down of ships with a view to their completion by spring of 1914, Mr. McKenna stated that as the building rate was two years for a ship, it would not be necessary to lay down dreadnoughts before December, 1911. These would be of the Orion type. He denied that there was any greatly increased cost for dreadnoughts, eight dreadnoughts cost the same as nine of the King Edward type and their maintenance cost £30,000 a year less. The British estimates of £15,000,000 compared with £12,000,000 of Germany appeared to represent more than the two-power standard, but ten and a half millions represented expenditure which Germany incorporated in her civil estimates. Referring to the cost of the voluntary system and the cost of the fleet in foreign waters Mr. McKenna incidentally mentioned that he was strongly in favour of conscription. He said that the voluntary policy was not to have conscription, he strongly supported that policy but economists should remember that voluntary service cost three millions extra for pay. He stated that Raysh as a naval base would be ready in 1915.

Mr. Balfour alluded to the grave situation confronting the nation in 1914. They must maintain their supremacy at home and also in the Mediterranean. Our total force in 1914, he said, would only be equal to the total force of the Triple Alliance. He dwelt on the necessity of our supremacy in the Mediterranean where our interests were greater than ever. The idea of abandoning the Mediterranean had never been entertained all the days of our maritime greatness. He further criticized the inadequate provision made to protect the commerce routes.

The debate largely dealt with Sir Edward Grey's arbitration intermission.
The Labourites Roberts moved that the increasing expenditure was a menace to peace and to our national security. He urged Sir E. Grey to bring Germany and France within a covenant of peace.
Mr. Balfour said the opposition would heartily support the arrangement suggested by Sir E. Grey which was the consummation of a policy for which they had constantly striven, but as America had never been the advocate of our maritime policy, therefore a reduction in the estimates could not be expected.
Mr. Roberts' motion was rejected by 215 votes to 4.

Mr. HOLDS with reference to the return of the Executive Council was asked for a copy of the minutes of the Executive Council. He stated that the minutes were not available to the public.

Audit Charges.

Mr. WOOD questioned the London audit charges.

Mr. WILSON. Thank you.

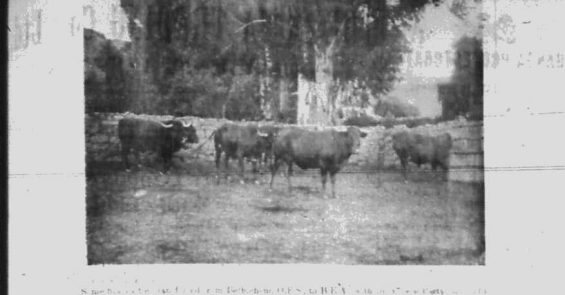

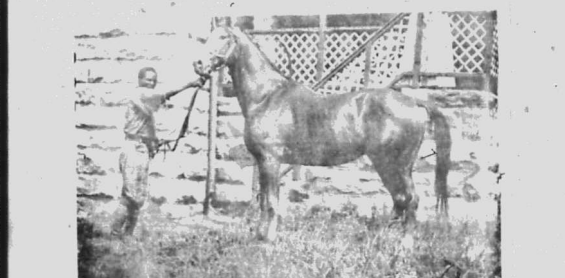

(SPECIAL TO THE "EAST AFRICAN STANDARD.")

The new appointment of Bishop Tucker marks the close of a remarkable episcopate. In length of time it has been remarkable. In twenty years covering the entire period of the life of a Missionary, Mr. Tucker has accomplished more than has been done in any other period of comparable length. 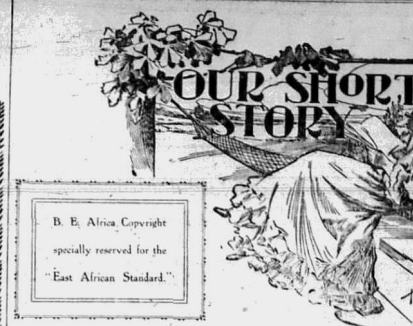
