JEWANEA.

SIR HARRY JOHNSTON ON THE PROPOSED AFRICAN SETTLEMENT.

Mr Harry Johnston, who was defeated as the Liberal candidate for Rochester, raised by a representative of the Jewish Colonization Society the offer of a tract of land in the East African Protectorate to the Jews.

Mr Harry is not content however in the Jewish case, unless he sees members of his own family are of Jewish origin, so that "in getting the land, one does the slightest bit of Jewing."

"I suppose," asked the interviewer, "you approve of the foundation of a Jewish colony in British East Africa?"

"I regard it as thoroughly unchristianlike and un-Jewish."

When you have selected the large piece of land which you, by treaty and other rights, he reserved to the natives, you will improve, the balance remaining will certainly have a sufficient area for a Jewish colony of any size—say 100,000 acres.

By British subjects, as regards the purchase of every acre, and religion, I regard every man as a British subject, for a Jew is no more a British subject than a Hindu is.

"Do I understand you to say, Sir Harry, that there have been Jews out in those parts?"

"Of course. Several officials have been Jews, though to be sure, I don't go about asking the Jews their origin."

It is not less suitable for Jews than for Englishmen. The beauty, loneliness and productivity of it cannot be exaggerated. It is the best impracticable of all the schemes, and would appeal to an overwhelming mass of our people. DEATH OF Mr. T. E. C. REMINGTON.

OUR COUNTRY'S LOSS.

Throughout the country the news of Mr. Remington's death was heard with deep regret. In Mombasa the feeling was even more profound, for here he was always the leader socially, and in his official capacity there was not a more obliging or energetic man.

Those who had dealings with the late Mr. Remington will bear testimony as to his absolute fairness and straightforwardness to the public. He was an ideal Postmaster General. He was an ideal good fellow.

Only a few days before his death, while riding on the writer's gharri he was planning a Christmas party for his son, Georgie, and mentioned the fact that he had already ordered the toys for it for the Christmas Tree.

The late Mr. Remington was ever fond of talking of his boy's latest escapades, and used to compare notes with the writer.

We offer our most sincere sympathy to Mrs. Remington and her son.

The late Mr. Thomas Edward Crew Remington was appointed to the British East Africa Protectorate

in November, 29, 1890. He was appointed Post Master General for East Africa and Zanzibar, July 1, 1896; Postmaster General for East Africa Protectorate and Uganda, January 1, 1899; H. H. Sultan of Zanzibar's order of Hamoudich (fourth class), medal and clasp, 1897.

This is the late Mr. Remington's official record according to the East Africa and Uganda Diary, and we may add to that—that he was the first Post Master General in the Protectorate, having come out from the G. P. O. staff in London in 1890, during the old Company's time. He took an active part in the Takaunga-Mazrui War in 1897, for which he obtained the medal.

Since the two Protectorates of Telegraph and Postal Services have been amalgamated, under the late Mr. Remington, the following are a few of the important events which have happened:

The East-Africa and Uganda Protectorates have joined the Universal Postal Union.

A parcel post service (including insurance) and a money order system has been established with the Colonies and Foreign Countries.

The introduction of Travelling Postal Carriages on the Uganda Railway.

The reduction of Inland and Foreign letter and parcel rates.

About the middle day of this year the Uganda Railway Telegraph system was amalgamated with the Postal Dept. and it may be that the additional work cast upon Mr. Remington's shoulders somewhat hastened his regrettable death.

THE FUNERAL ON TUESDAY.

At 11 o'clock, prompt Sir Charles Eliot, K.C.M.G., C.B., attended at Mrs. Remington's house and the mournful party then proceeded to the English Church. A detachment of Askaris, numbering about a hundred, under the command of Inspector Ewart and Inspector Watcham, headed the procession. By the side of the coffin walked the senior members of the late P.M.G.'s staff: Messrs. H. Holt, R. H. Long, and Syed Kassim. Then followed a car containing crosses and wreaths, amongst others from the following:

Sir Charles Eliot, Mr. and Mrs. Baty, Mr. and Mrs. Housstead, and the Postal and Telegraph staff.

The whole of the Postal and Telegraph Staff followed, after which came Sir Charles Eliot, Mrs. and Master George Remington.

By the time the front part of the procession had reached the Church door the last of the gharries was just past the public gardens, where, as a mark of respect, the officers of H. M. S. *Othello* joined. A very impressive funeral service took part in the English Church, conducted by the Rev. Mr. England. The church was full and many were standing behind and outside.

After service the coffin was borne to the cemetery by members of the P. O. Staff, the pallbearers being Dr.

The Latest Cases.

London, Oct. 31.—A demonstration was made on Thursday before the Port Labour Exchange against the proposed new Employment Agencies. This led to a fierce fight between the men and the police. Banners, knives, and chairs were used. Also bottles hurled from the neighbouring clubs, and several were thrown from the Exchange windows. Fifty-two of the police and seventy of the men were injured and many more had to go to hospital.

Zanzibar, Oct. 31.—The view prevailed here with regard to Count Lamadot's visit that it is at all events the most African and reassuring the Government regarding the forthcoming meeting of the War and the Kaiser.

London, Oct. 31.—Count Lamadot yesterday handed Mr. Lusk a letter, from the which he congratulates France on recent successes, mentioning the Anglo-French Agreement, Treaty, and the rapprochement with Italy, and states that in three or four fresh pages for the maintenance of the general peace which was the object of the Franco-Russian Alliance.

London, Nov. 2.—Shipping strikes in being extensively attended in Fuzhou. In the hospital there, there are three more patients who are being subjected to a treatment by Gochley, which is being most effectively during the plague in China.

London, Nov. 2.—Count Lamadot has left Paris.

London, Nov. 2.—M. Legendre has returned to Zhabul from a tour in the Danakil district. He hoisted the French flag at Lake Asal.

London, Nov. 2.—France was informed during a part of Saturday with regard to telegraphic communication with Europe and America, but the international communication was not disturbed. The cause is ascribed to magnetic phenomena due to some seismic disturbance.

London, Nov. 3.—Three rooms in the Vatican above the celebrated library were burned on Sunday night. His Holiness the Pope, fearing that the Papal documents were insufficient to cope with the war, ordered the Italian Government for aid. Various news items follow, including the death of the Interior, the Prefect of Police, and the Mayor of Rome, and were invited to enter and direct the operations. This is the first occasion since the fall of the Temporal Power that Italian Government officials have entered the Vatican in an official capacity.

London, Nov. 3.—Bester's Agent at Peking reports that a Conference was held yesterday between the Dowager Empress of China and the high officials regarding the re-occupation of Mukden by the Russians, and the Viceroy of Yanchow has been summoned from Tientsin.

London, Nov. 4.—Bester's Agent at Yokohama writes that it is officially announced that the Russians have demolished the Fort at Yonaguchi withdrawing their troops and only leaving a garrison of 100 men.

London, Nov. 4.—The Correspondent of the "Daily Telegraph" at Aden advises that the Italian cruiser "Leonardo" called for Omba, and that the "Cocle," "Cecilia," and the British ship "Porpoise" are due to sail to-day.
