WORLD'S NEWS.

Home Rule. COMMITTEE STAGE PASSED.

(Reuter's Special to "E. A. Standard," London, Dec. 19)

The Commons have adopted the guidelines on the remaining clauses of the Home Rule Bill which is now before its committee stage. With reference to Sir Rufus Isaacs' amendment, that member denied that the object of the amendment to clause 42 was made to embarrass the Unionists by passing the bill first so that if an election followed and the Government were defeated the Unionists would be compelled to repeal the act. The only object of the amendment was to facilitate the administration of Ireland.

ASQUITH OVALED.

The House of Commons has adopted the scheduled Home Rule Bill. Nine divisions had to be taken on it and the last one was brought to a close at midnight. The Ministerial benches were packed and the Government's majority reached 113 in the first division. The last division was closed for several minutes. Mr. Asquith on leaving the House received a tremendous ovation. His supporters stood up and cheered him. There was a tremendous scene of hackerish waving.

Control of Pacific.

New Zealand's Enthusiasm. IDEAL OF THE SOUTHERN DOMINIONS.

Washington, Dec. 19. Mr. Allen the Minister of Defense for New Zealand attended a banquet given to him by the citizens of Wellington prior to his departure for London. The speeches made were most enthusiastic in declaring his readiness of New Zealand to take her full share in the Imperial Defense. Mr. Allen said that the ideal was for the Southern Dominions to keep open our trade routes. There was also no reason why Canada, Australia and New Zealand should South Africa and India should not unite in maintaining a Pacific fleet. The speaker proposed to build up a local navy for purely local purposes. A telegram of congratulation was sent by the banquet to Premier Borden.

Channel Collision.

ITALIAN STEAMER WRECKED.

London, Dec. 19. From wreckage found it leaves scarcely any doubt that it was the Italian steamer Duran which with 25 crew aboard, and the Oprey, which was sunk by the Centurion.

London, Dec. 19. The oiler Osprey which was posted overseas has arrived at Portland Bill.

Labour Trouble.

PUBLIC INQUIRY.

London, Dec. 19. A public inquiry is being made into the case of the Oprey. The proceedings have been adjourned until to-morrow.

It is about time that the R. E. A. Treasury made arrangements to exchange English silver for the currency notes of the British West Africa and Nairobi.

Since its formation well-attended drills have been held every Monday evening in Irwin's Hall, generously placed at the disposal of the Unit by Messrs. George Irwin and Sons for that purpose. Conference Adjourned

Feeling Running High.

TURKS SUSPECTED OF DELIBERATELY DELAYING

(Heuter's Special on "E. A. Standard")

The Council of Ministers have again sent instructions to the Ottoman delegates regarding the attitude of the Greeks in the Peace Conference.

London, Dec. 19. Today's (Thursday) conference meeting was attended with considerable apprehension as feeling amongst the Balkanians is running very high in view of the Turkish deliberately delaying the conference. They will not accept any Turkish proposals suggestive of the restoration of arrangements such as the reconstituting of that city. Thus 13 days sitting will probably be required.

A momentary sensation was caused by the Turkish delegates hurrying into the conference after an interval of an hour but it was quickly announced that it was a current matter. Such was because the Turkish instructions which had just been received are showing the delegates to agree to recognize the Turkish claims of the latter against the Armenians.

JANINA AFBAY

The official version as given by the Turkish side is that 100 Turkish troops were detained after a matter of six hours and sustained 100 killed and 1,00 wounded, and abandoned three quarters.

(Brest's Special to "E. K. Standard.") Constantinople, Dec. 19
The Council of Ministers have again sent instructions to the Greek delegates regarding the attitude of the Greeks in the Peace Conference.

London, Dec. 19
Today's (Thursday) conference meeting is awaited with considerable anticipation as being very high in view of the Turkish delinquency in the Peace Conference. They will not listen to any Turkish proposals suggestive of the restoration of Constantinople such as the re-entrance of that city. Thus today's sitting will probably be crucial.

A momentary session was caused by the Turkish delegates hurrying alone from the Conference after an hour's sitting but it was quickly announced that it was adjourned until Saturday because the Turkish instructions which had not been received are coming by a special courier from Constantinople. It is stated that the Porte has directed the delegates to agree to anything the Greeks without the latter signing the armistice.

JAJINA AFFRAY.

The official version as given by the Turkish side is that near Jajina the Greeks were defeated after a battle of six hours and sustained 400 killed and 120 wounded, and abandoned three quicktrains.

Trouble in Portugal.

Extremist Republican Unrest. INCENDIARISM AND BOMB THROWING.

Lisbon, Dec. 19
The Premier has postponed his visit to Oporto. It is reported that this is in connection with a project of a coup d'etat at Lisbon by the extreme republicans. The troops have been confined to their barracks for five days.

An explosion occurred in a powder magazine in the suburbs of Challes. One person was killed, a bomb was exploded at Bodo station when a train was fatally injured.

Kith and Kin.

Russia's Interest in the Balkans. HOPES OF A PEACEFUL SETTLEMENT.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 19
M. Khorostinski speaking before the Duma said that Russia as a great Slavonic Power cannot be indifferent as to whether the Balkans obtain the conditions of existence consonant with their achievements and blood and thereby lay the basis of a new organization of the future, nor can the Government under-rate Russia's historic interests. There was no reason to change their aims and aims. Russia was bound of the support of her friends by the fact of her interests with the just demands of the Balkans when the Government had the most serious feeling and for whose sake the Government welcomed the British initiative for a settlement.

H.M.S. NATAL to CONYVENS REMAINS TO U.E.A.

The United States of America has accepted the offer of a battleship to convey the remains of Ambassador Reid from London to his home.

Naval Scandal.

Indictment of Mr. Churchill.

Over-Interference with Naval Functions.

First Lord's Denial.

While the motion of a 'journalist of the Admiralty' was being discussed in the Commons Lord Charles Beresford said that Admiral Bridgeman was notoriously indiscreet with him and indiscreet to himself (Admiral Beresford) being Admiral of the Fleet. He took the case up as there was an action pending in the court on Mr. Churchill's behalf. Mr. Churchill had promised that he would not be asked if Admiral Bridgeman was officer of the Fleet and the Admiralty of the Fleet if he kept silent. Mr. Churchill's policy was one of bribe and threats and he assumed both the executive and administrative functions and even took up charge during the manoeuvres.

Mr. Churchill replied to this indictment with some heat. He said that the Hon. member for Portsmouth had made the gross insinuations going to disquiet the public mind. He reiterated that Admiral Bridgeman's resignation was due to reasons of health only. He knew of no difference between the ordinary resignation of an officer and his colleague. He repeated that the Admiral with highest rank had exhibited himself in his duties. He wrote to his colleagues on November 20th that he was depressed about his health having had two attacks of bronchitis in two months on top of an attack of influenza. Mr. Churchill declared that he felt that he was not doing his duty to keep him at the helm in these serious times. He was satisfied that he had constituted the highest interests of the navy and had only done his duty. Mr. Bonar Law said that he understood that Admiral Bridgeman had quite recently threatened to resign if Mr. Churchill insisted upon carrying out his views. Mr. Churchill replied: "I never made such a statement to me."

Peace Delegates.

Lunch at Mansion House.

The Lord Mayor's invitation to luncheon to the Peace Delegates was accepted and the luncheon was held at the Mansion House on Monday. The delegates were accompanied by the Lord Mayor. In his speech Mr. Asquith emphasized that he was not anxious to call himself an expert in this connection, but that would come to be considered one of the proudest honours in London's territorial crown. The various delegates made complimentary speeches hopeful of the success of their mission.

London, Dec. 21. Premier Poincare in a speech made before the French Chamber drew out the essence of the agreement of the Entente Powers in the Balkan theatre. He praised the initiative of Great Britain in arranging the Conference of Ambassadors which had succeeded in eliminating one of the principal causes of European tension. It was believed to be Serbia, from the Ambassador's viewpoint. He underlined, that Albanian autonomy would be constituted under the suzerainty of the Sultan of Turkey, and would be controlled by a free and neutral and would serve an international military which would also be controlled by Europe, with free transit for all goods including war stores. The Masai raid has been awful in its magnitude, as the last body I viewed was lying near a fire where the man had apparently been cooking his food; he was dismembered, a spear thrust in the chest, also three threats in the back.

The second I found in the house. He had two wounds in the back, also two wounds in the left side.

The third I found about fifty yards distant in the bush. He had three sword gashes in the neck as well as several wounds in the back.

Interview with His Excellency.

We have received the following correspondence from the official members of the Nairobi Municipal Committee for publication:—

To the Editor of the "E. A. Standard." Sir,—In view of the great interest taken by the public in the negotiations regarding the sale of the new Provincial Office and in the questions that have arisen thereon, we the official members of the Nairobi Municipal Committee think it right to inform you of an interview which took place at Government House on Saturday morning between His Excellency the Governor, who invited us to be present in order that he might remove misapprehensions which had arisen in the matter, and ourselves.

You will recollect that the question first came under the notice of the Municipal Committee on 5th instant, when it was first discovered that the foundations for the new Provincial Offices were being prepared so as to sit on the site of the Government House.

The meeting was immediately convened and a resolution passed stating the grounds upon which the Municipal Committee objected to the site selected. A copy of the resolution was forwarded to the Commissioner on the same day, and it is to be regretted that work should be suspended. On the 10th instant the matter was again brought before the Municipal Committee at an ordinary meeting when a resolution was passed asking for suspension of operations and requesting that His Excellency should receive a deputation of the Committee to the subject. This resolution was forwarded to the Provincial Commissioner next morning.

On the 17th instant when the next ordinary meeting of the Municipal Committee took place the matter was brought before the Provincial Commissioner, which has already appeared in your columns, was read to the Committee.

This was the position of affairs when the interview in question took place. We enclose a brief account of what passed.

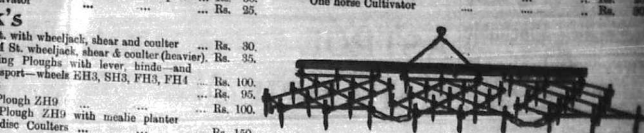
