HOME.

Christmas Eve.

Stranded Steamer Attacked.
A steamer from Gibraltar states that the British steamer "Ludgate" has gone ashore on the African coast opposite Sierra Leone. A band of Moorish pirates attacked and wounded a seaman. The steamer "Hornburgh" and "Pelago" steamed to her assistance. On the morning of the 6th, the Moor, salvage operators are suspended. The salvage steamer "Rescue" has gone ashore with two sailing guns on board, together with a naval packet.
A subsequent telegram states that two British and two Spanish warships have arrived at the scene and the Moors are now quiet. The cargo, which is of coal, is being jettisoned.

The cruiser "Hornburgh" has returned to Gibraltar and reports "all quiet." It is hoped to refuel the stranded steamer.
On Sunday night, says Reuter's Gibraltar correspondent, the Moors made a fresh attack on the British steamer "Ludgate," a Spanish cruiser, "Puma," immediately used her searchlights to locate the intruder, and sent four marines with quick-firing guns on board to meet the enemy. By this means the Moors were peppered round, and the vessel retired to a panic to the mountains. The British and Spanish standing by and salvaged work is proceeding.
A fair cablegram states that the "Ludgate" has been refueled and has arrived at Gibraltar.

A STRANDED PROJECT.
Sir Ernest Shackleton, the explorer, in a letter to the "Times" says he is still through the generality of a friend to announce definitely that he will lead an expedition in 1914 across the Antarctic Continent. This will be called the Imperial Trans-Atlantic Expedition, because he focuses his king men of all lands under the Union Jack will be willing to assist in carrying out the mail programme of the expedition.
"Times" adds that the expedition will start from the South Africa port and his for the object of the crossing of the South Pole and returning by way of New Zealand.
In an interview with Reuter's Agency, Sir Ernest Shackleton has said there will be two ships engaged for the Imperial Trans-Atlantic Expedition across the South Polar region. One will proceed to New Zealand in August and the other to South America in October. The first will carry fifty thirty tons, as the vessels will be oil-driven and will thus need smaller crews. Mr. Frank Wild will be second in command, and there will be six picked men to accompany Shackleton across the Antarctic Continent. Apart from the crew and outfit needed on the two ships there will be a staff of one doctor or an, including a biologist, a zoologist, a geologist or each ship.

1,000 Miles of New Lays.

Continuing, Sir E. Shackleton says: "The plan is to cross the Antarctic from Weddell Sea to Ross Sea, Victoria Land, and it will be the longest polar journey ever attempted. Possibly the next miles it will be to get a map and to find the whole journey will comprise 1,000 miles of new ground. Thus, from a geographical point of view, we may solve the problem of the Southern nature of the Antarctic. For instance, the discovery of a great mountain range, which I suppose exists. Such a discovery would be a most important geographical discovery. We shall also make investigations into new branches of science. If we can start in November from the Weddell Sea we hope to arrive in Ross Sea in March, 1915. We shall take one hundred and twenty dogs, with Canadian drivers, and will be fully equipped for two years. The sledges will be driven by men and dogs. The sledges will be made of sheepskin, with slipping wheels to glide on the ice."

A FATAL PANIC.
Reuter's correspondent at Michigan reports that during a panic, mostly children, were killed during a panic caused by a false alarm of fire during a Christmas eve celebration in the city of Detroit. The fatalities were caused by stamping in the corridor amid the singing.
The children had finished a programme of recitations and began to sing. They were crowded towards the rear of the hall, where a bandmaster had his head in the door and yelled "Fire." Immediately there was a panic and the children of the school and men, women, and children thrashed to the exit and the weaker were thrown to the floor. Those behind climbed over the general forms and the doorway was so completely blocked that rescue of the weaker was impossible. The panic subsided the doorway was completely choked with dead bodies, emerging from the steps to the ceiling.
The dead included thirty-two girls, thirteen boys and thirteen women, besides five men. Other bodies were found, but they were carried away before their bodies were seen. The bodies were found in a pitiful scene followed the catastrophe, women and men rushing hither and thither calling for missing children in various tongues and nations.

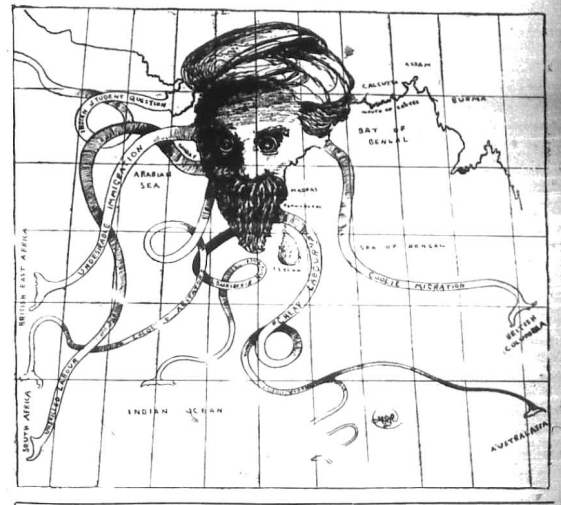

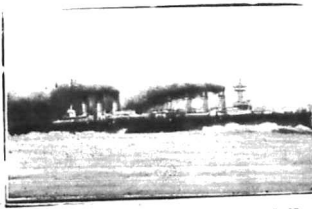

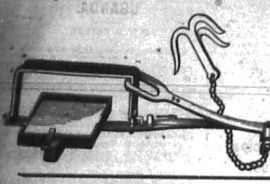

Primitive Races of East Competitions for Cotton. Africa. Proposed Official Survey.

A memorial for presentation to the Colonial Secretary has been drawn up and is in course of signature by the leading agriculturists of Great Britain in favor of the appointment of a Government anthropologist to conduct an expedition to East Africa. It urges upon the Government that without delay an anthropological survey be made of the primitive races of East Africa in the interests of good government and that within those regions there are a number of large tribes in various stages of barbarism which have as yet come little under British influence and about which we know very little. It is important that a full and accurate record of the institutions, laws, customs, and habits of those tribes should be obtained, both for scientific reasons and to facilitate Government dealings with the natives. The comparatively trifling cost of obtaining such a record would soon be covered by the enormous amount of revenue the avoidance of punitive expeditions and petty wars that often arise from official ignorance of tribal habits and usages. It is urged that the Government should be able to obtain an exact record of many tribes and usages that will be most valuable to the Government as well as to the natives. It is proposed that the work previously done by him with inadequate resources should be revived and that the Government should now be requested to support it.

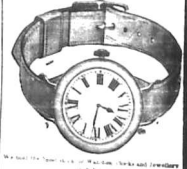
