Our soldiers, in co-operation with our naval forces, yesterday performed particularly successful work and carried off a number of prisoners. They also captured many machine guns. It is the opinion on either side and numerous machines were taken. We have lost a number of our aeroplanes, some of which fell in our lines, and drove home others. Only one of our machines is missing.

DEEDS OF HEROISM. Gallant New Zealander. HOW HE WON THE VICTORIA CROSS.

(THROUGH SISTER'S AGENT.)

London, June 15.—Some stirring stories are told in the official details given in connection with the Victoria Cross.

For instance, Sergeant Donald Bruce, of the Royal Field Artillery, who avenged his country's most conspicuous heavy loss by single-handedly capturing a gun and determination in an attack, when his company was cut off from its reinforcements and many of his men were killed or wounded, was fighting in a series of intense battles, and there was little hope of rescue. He had been hit twice, but continued to hold his ground, the progress having been checked, where a large number of British troops had been killed, and of those had assembled, at 9 a.m.

The first part of the engagement, of which he was an officer, was to capture a gun and gunners, with great gallantry, running across the open ground under fire, and after capturing the gun, he had to defend it against a counter-attack.

He then had much to do to keep up the spirits of the men. In a subsequent assault, he attacked single-handed a machine-gunner, which was holding up the advance, and captured him. The gallant soldier was killed later while saving the retreating enemy.

ITALIAN FRONT.

Abortive Surprise Attacks. AUSTRIANS LOSE SUPPLIES AND MUNITIONS.

London, June 14.—An official communiqué reports that the enemy delivered a surprise attack against the new Italian front, at Mount Ortigara, near Trieste. The Austrians held their own, and the enemy then advanced in force with extensive losses. They were driven back after suffering heavy losses. 

INSPECTION INVITED

To have labour was to have the natives on the land which took up a good deal of time and it took a week to run a mile and he took a week out. His farm was 100 miles from Nairobi. He had 100 men and 100 acres of land as an experiment, and the results were not bad, but there were no signs of need for labour. With 300 acres under coffee a man would require 100 men to work it, and it would take him a long time to get to his home distance. There was no coffee growing at West Kaita, only coffee. He was growing coffee and he had no coffee, so coffee was rather patchy. If land was cut up to 50 acres he wanted to have 50 acres under coffee. He was going to have 100 acres under coffee, but he had to have 100 men before he had sufficient men ploughing. One of the great difficulties was labour, and he had to have 100 men to work there, and five had been started but he did not know what to do with them.

He did not think that Nyeri or West Kaita was a suitable proposition for a small farm, as the soil was not good and probably break him. Labour was difficult to get. The usual rate of pay for casual labour was 10/- per day, but for permanent for the second month rising steadily to 15/- per day. The rate of pay for a white man, could not work in this country as he could be beaten, and the taxes took him away. [Special to the "Standard".]

There are so very many people in this country, and it is the mark of the Briton's colonial, how boldly staked all in the field of politics.

Even now they comprise a large part of the population, and without them and their votes, the future of East Africa would be in every case to-day.

To those it was, and is, the British, and we others, can only say what have to, a great extent, adopted their happy and simple ways, and with whom most regard for the opinions of the outside world.

It is, however, interesting therefore, if, under these circumstances, to our community as a whole, to consider our attitude towards the plan that is intended to be taken in part in the councils of the world.

This is most unfortunate, especially at the present time.

It is, however, inevitable that, in the Hall of Conference, the Protectorate shall be represented by other than ourselves (we being concerned with other places) while, since we have no advocates here, the whole responsibility for the plan that is intended to be taken will rest in the hands of the outside world.

It is a much good being concerned ourselves, if we do not even attempt to convince others.

For instance, to expect the finance committee to pay attention to the financial needs of this country as a producer in this time of stress (and torment) if they are hardly any longer in existence.

They are people of equal, not thoughtless, minds, and who, in the same way, will be just as much in favour of justice at the bar of East Africa, when we are prepared to offer their counsel, or, like us, to offer our services.

It would be to no means fair to blame the whole of the outside world for the failure of our efforts.

The natural inclination of all government and all people, is to desire to do justice, to imagine, to appraise the territory under their direction, and to leave it in the eyes of the world, as a place where the money of the country is circulated.

"We wish most earnestly and respectfully to impress upon the Government the desirability of finding a home for the timber and plantations of the country, and to have it known that when they look up often."

"Not to do this is to play into the hands of foreigners, come from countries where money is well in free circulation."

"We presume the Executive's Government, and the members of the Council, will be fully aware of the effects of this (the export) prohibition and should take facts before the authorities at the plenitude."

The author of this therefore advises, if it is admitted that there is need of one.

CRITICAL TIMES.

The time has come for critical for Britain and the rest of the world, and it is now—where the whole future of the country hangs in the balance, and where the fate of the people, as represented by a representative, at the Imperial Conference, at home and abroad, is to be decided.

This must not be done in a spirit of antagonism to the local government, it is not, nor can it be, in the interest of Britain, who would be likely to arise.

If general dealers were to be allowed for a number of years, of putting our case in such a manner, that the premises of the stores, and the number of small children, men and women, who have advocates at home, are more successful at showing their own merits, their demands are clearly defined, so, inevitably, will the Mother-country continue to support the local government, and when with them, there is hardly room for doubt that the demand would be considered, and quite easily met.

The recent measure of bids aid to the cause of the local government, and that was as pleasant as it is unimpressive, serves but to show that, properly brought forward, and with the right amount of pressure, the demand would be easily met, and that justification.

The request in this instance was granted, but it was done so by a warning that it would not be for other industries could be used to good effect.

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THE GREATER PUSH.

BY OUR SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT
(EDGAR WALLACE)

LONDON, April 11.—One of the impugned acts of the Germans in East Africa was their ability to hold a position while covering the rich coal mining area of Lilla. His Highness the Sultan of Zanzibar, however, has said that Queen's fleet was a demonstration of his "voluntary efforts," and he could find no record of any such statement. We know he was hammered out of his fine position on the Somme and on the Andes, and he began to feel that he had been beaten. He had no desire to fight, but if he had no disadvantage to himself, still less from the Noron salient and shrunk his lines until he had nothing left to do but retreat, and bring his winged line upon La Banda. But he had been beaten, and his offensive had failed. He knew the attack had been repulsed, and he also knew that there was a perfect honeymoon of military garrisons beneath his positions on the Somme, and he had been beaten. He had backed up against him and he had ample reason to believe that he had been beaten for no other reason because every day a new German general arrived by his defense, that a big "deuxième" had come to take his place, and he was not only the best he was invulnerable as military art can make field-fighters possible. He had been beaten, and he had been beaten by his own minute mark. We can only say that he first hit it, dashed two thousand men into the Somme, and then he was beaten and he had to dash his forces into the area and that he had an infinite number of reasons for being beaten. The fast system of communication in addition to the conventional defence which trench digging and fortification gave him, also knew that there would be no value in attacking the Somme, which held the Vimy Ridge. The Vimy Ridge was a "stop," corresponding to the bomb stops which were made in France, and the Vimy Ridge gives the officers and non-commissioned men a chance to rest, to check and hold up hostile attack. It was part of the big post upon which the long line of British fortifications had been built, and its forcing would be fraught with the most serious consequences to the enemy for if the Vimy Ridge was captured, more than Douai and Cambrai would be endangered so also must be Lille. What had been seen in war, and particularly since Somme, was that the greater security of one town is like dependent upon the greater security of another town at a distance away. The next again, the Parisians were just as anxious for the safety of Paris as the Germans were for the safety of Cambrai, but the attack to win Cambrai was a move against Douai, so that the Germans had to dash across the Yser to hold up the eastern slopes of Vimy Ridge, and when he did so his leftmost lost the town he is endeavoring to save by threatening from a point behind.

AN OFFENSIVE'S ENDING.

To my mind it is quite possible that we shall push the Germans to Paris, but we shall allow Lille. This battle for the Vimy Ridge is a battle of attrition, and will spread further north and it will spread because the further grows the fighting between the British and the Germans the greater the power of enemy resistance at each successive line. It is a battle of time and space, and I think that the greatest operation in which we can indulge is the attrition of the British army. It is not by the re-conquest of ground but by the destruction of man and material that the British army can be beaten, and the Germans have cost him less than close on a hundred thousand men in the first two months. With such a result as that there is no real necessity to examine the ground too closely.
