By the Editor. "E. A. BRADSHAW." I should like to make a few remarks on the subject of the Indian agitation in India...

Unfortunately, the communal spirit of Indian opinion is conspicuous by its absence, both in the Association's letters to the Acting Governor, and the minutes presented as having been passed by the meeting of the Indian residents. In the latter it must be remembered that the Tropical School of Medicine views Europeans against living too near Asiatic and African habitations or among such people. It is very stupid not to be able to distinguish between hygiene and racialism.

Further the social habits of the European and Asiatic differ considerably, demanding from the architect and builder due consideration. We do not know how possibly the British, living more and more in the open, appreciate the value of their windows and doors, with the least possible wall or fence between them.

The Asiatic, on the other hand, holds fast to domestic seclusion. Indeed the higher the caste or the richer he is the higher his enclosure are built. In fact, the Asiatic representative in the Municipal Council, sending a letter to "blaming the committee in spirit his neighbours or seriously against the circulation of the air, verandahs were widely erected, the season being, I do not believe, preparing humbly of its leaving country, and the health consequences are as distinct from racialism as white is from black.

INDIAN CLAIMS
Mr. H. Jowers Sets Out Some Other Points

To the Editor "E. A. STANBORN."
Sir.—The claim to racial equality, whatever the phrase may mean, put forward by the Indian community of E.A.A. is in many respects, justly for the demand of political equality. This demand, as voiced by the spokesmen of the community in the Press, appears to be based on three main grounds:—

- (1) that India has contributed to the common cause of the Empire in this and previous wars;
- (2) that Indians bear the brunt of taxation in this country; and
- (3) that Indians are in no sense inferior to the white races. As one writer puts it:—"We are inferior not in origin, intellect, numbers, morality, civilization, industry and commerce, but we are decidedly inferior in might." Let us meet these protagonists on their own ground and examine their arguments one by one.

It would be invidious to discriminate between the merits of Indian and other troops, but Indians must remember that Africa has never fought in the common cause with at least equal valour and self-sacrifice. It is no more true to say that Indian troops saved E.A.A. than to say that the K.A.R. did. Nobody desires, however, to disparage the services rendered by India, which will always be held in grateful remembrance. But if political equality is to be claimed on the ground of services rendered or sacrifices made, it would be logical to show equality of service or sacrifice. What are the facts? In the present war India has a population of over 315 million soldiers, or about 1 per cent. of her population. Great Britain alone with a population of some 45 million soldiers, has contributed no fewer than 65 millions of men to the fighting forces of the Empire. It is not surprising that the Indian Empire is a decided net contributor of treasure from India has not so far as I am aware, been published, but there is no reason to suppose that they are in higher

proportion. To argue that "she has it was Britain's war," is to require a complete ignorance of the issues at stake. It is equivalent to an avowal that India, in its position in relation to other peoples, is in a position of equality, and since equal rights imply equal responsibilities, it is a contradiction to the present claim of the Indian community.

In support of their second contention, the Indian champions tout that ancient and despatched postal hucksters—no condition without representation." But no logic, however wise or however noble, is of universal application, and the maxims of the West have not necessarily any bearing on the problems of the East. In B.E.A. a large proportion, if not the bulk of the taxation is borne ultimately by the native. Does any sane Indian contend that on that ground the African is entitled to a position of political equality? If not, the argument fails.

We need on delicate ground when we reach the third basis of claim. The term "inferior race" is unfortunate, and was needlessly introduced into the controversy. The Hindu invaders of India are said to have been of the Aryan race, of like origin with the Anglo-Saxons, and the bulk of the Indian population are derived from this stock. The architecture, sculpture, their architectural monuments, and their engineering works alone prove that this race was not so mean a capacity. But ancient glories have little relevance to modern conditions, and it is in their present schismatenism that the facts seem for the past two centuries India has produced no notable contributor, with the possible exception of Bahadurshah's Papers, to art, science, literature, or original thought. The tenets and practices of her predominant religions are primitive and divorced from considerations of Western morality. The masses of the population are steeped in ignorance and superstition and their state of civilization is comparable to that of England at the time of the Druids. The census of 1911 showed that only 106 men per mile, and 10 females per mile could read and write. In other words some 90 per cent of the population are illiterate.

It was only in 1910 that the first instruction in mathematics was given, and then, not at the expense of the people but by the strong arms of infant marriage is especially the marriages of widows, especially widowed in childhood, a source of discontentment.
