Motor Fire Engine for Kimberley.

A motor steam engine has just been supplied to the Kimberley Fire Brigade by Messrs. Merryweather of London. It is of the "D" type, also in service at Cape Town and Johannesburg, and will deliver 400 gallons of water per minute, whilst a speed of 30 miles per hour can be registered on the road. The carriage and boiler have been made specially heavy and strong, owing to the rough nature of the South African roads. The boiler is fired with oil fuel, with automatic arrangements for burning oil if required, and the wheels are fitted with india-rubber tyre, the hind ones being with rigid section, whilst the front ones are provided with non-skid chains.

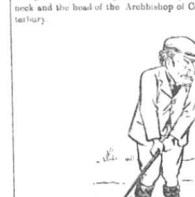

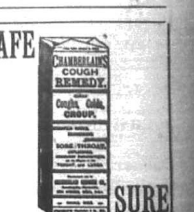

**LEASEHOLD LAND CONDITIONS.**

TO THE EDITOR OF "THE EAST AFRICAN STANDARD."

Sir,—I shall be obliged, if you can find space for the following remarks:—

In the recent judgment given by His Honor, Judge Birch in my Lease Agreement appeal the value to be paid me as compensation in a general suit by the Government for the land which I have been forced to surrender to the Protectorate for similar areas to the effect that the land is leased for purposes of Agriculture and raising stock only. This is a matter of course which must interest all holders of leasehold land. My own case is a good example of the way in which the Government in my lease is held to prevent my either erecting buildings (other than Farm buildings) or selling the land at its building value to any one else for that purpose.

Now it must be admitted I think that unless the country is going to revert to the Kikuyu this land at Limuru Railway Station will in the ordinary course of progress be built over long before the termination of my 99 years lease. That this would be the case if I and others near the station were to refuse, during the period of our leases, to part with the land for agricultural uses, or other that some one else may realize its building value, either the Railway Stations would have to be changed or the land compulsorily acquired by Government. Evidently, I believe, a dealer who had taken up 1,000 acres of leasehold land, received his lease, with the covenant in question inserted, and he pointed out that the land was unsuitable either for agriculture or grazing, being here and there, but could get no redress. I was for 24 years in possession of my land before obtaining the lease but in spite of protests could not get the covenant deleted.

It is curious that restrictions should be placed on the development of the land for purposes of agriculture or grazing, when the value of the land is to be determined on the basis of its building value. It is to be noted in the interest of the country that buildings should be put up, and also that the value of the land is to be determined on the basis of its building value.

**THE LABOR RULES.**

TO THE EDITOR OF "THE EAST AFRICAN STANDARD."

Sir,—Having had some experience of the conditions under which contract labour is recruited in India I beg to make a few comparisons between the terms proposed in the recent labour ordinance and the regulations in force in India. The labour ordinance recently promulgated would appear to be intended to provide for the demand for contract labour for short terms of engagement up to perhaps 6 months but the Indian Act provides for labour being put under contract for 5 years. The Indian law gardens wages their labour 5 years. I am glad to provide this, meaning, as, as in the Labour ordinance it is not food. The Indian wages are 10 p per month, and in India and the employer is bound to see that the man has food or that the man has a house. The local food being the employer has to make good to the labourers any increase in price which may occur owing to the fluctuations or else he can import rice and supply the labourers good live food for use and his wages as pocket money also in the Indian Act in the event of fluctuation the law is put in force and the despatch when caught is published and made to work out its engagement but there is no provision made here for these cases. The result of the proposed Labour Ordinance would be that the man would get labour at least 3 times their present wage.

### The Zulu Trouble.

Prompt Measures. Dinuzulu Lodged in Goal.

The 13 Troops occupy all strategic points in Zululand and Combs are watching the country for movements that threaten the safety of the operations in the north.

The 14 There is feeling at the Hill Quarters also throughout the Natal Press that Dinuzulu should be deported even if he is found innocent, otherwise there is danger of a re-encounter of blood.

The 15 Twelve British troops made a demonstration at the 12th camp, the Zulus were surprised and made to retreat. The search for Dinuzulu, however, was fruitless.

The 16 Dinuzulu has started for Durban. Col. Mackenzie's troops have returned to Nongoma. While marching through the disturbed areas they discovered a number of young Zulu tribesmen with rifles to be missing.

The 17 The principal natives accompanying Dinuzulu have been arrested on suspicion of sedition.

The 18 Dinuzulu with attendants has arrived at Mantsiaba and has been lodged in the goal.

### The Cattles Drives.

Government not Inactive. 13 Cattle drives cleared 400 herds in Zululand. The 14 The 13th and 14th of cattle drives at Hlatshulu using bullocks freely.

The 15 There was another cattle drive yesterday through the Tumbane Neighbourhood. The operation was a total success. One cow was lost as the 16th of the drive was over with Police.

The 17 Mr. Birrell replying to a deputation of Landowners Convention recognized the seriousness of cattle driving which was illegal and undesirable. He stated that Government were inactive showing that 200 people had been bound over and had not taken the offence, he forewarned legislation.

The 18 Mr. Roosevelt has issued a formal statement declaring that he will not be generally elected in New York that this being a third term of the Presidency. The Democratic leaders declare that the chances of their Candidate are improved.

Meets the Coast Planters.

RESULT OF RECOMMENDATIONS.

(Continued from last week.)

A meeting of the Land Board was held at Mombasa on December 13th last at which Deputations were received from the various Planters' District Associations. They were present:

Mr. A. C. MacDonald, Director of Agriculture in the chair. Major E. G. Smith, B. E. Jones and B. M. Davis of Malindi and Land Officer. Major Leggett, M.A., M.S., Hon'ble A. A. Baillie and Mr. A. S. Fleemmer, Members of the Land Board. Mr. Soboleff, Chairman—Director of Agriculture (Mr. A. C. MacDonald).

The following Planters made up the Deputation, Mr. A. G. Anderson and Advocate de Lacey of Mombasa, Messrs J. E. Jones and B. M. Davis of Malindi and Mr. Ward of the Anglo-American Company of Vol. Major Leggett was also a member of the Deputation in addition to occupying his seat as a member of the Board.

After discussing the various proposals for dealing with Crown Land generally and the recommendations made to the Secretary of State for the Colonies by the Law Board, the following recommendations were made:

DEFINITION OF COAST LANDS.

1. That the definition of what should be considered as "Coast Land" should be left to the consideration of the Honourable the Commissioners of Lands, acting on the advice of the Law Board.

TERMS OF ACQUISITION OF LAND.

1. That the opinion of the "Planters' Association" should be granted on a 99 years lease at a graduated rental commencing at very low rates and revertible within prescribed terms at pre-stated intervals.

Area of Plantations.

The Planter's Association recommended that no excessive areas be granted but that the size of areas be left to the Honourable the Commissioner of Lands, seeing by and with the approval of the Law Board, Municipal & Suburban Areas.

Later in the day the Land Board met again to consider the recommendations made by the Planters' Association as to the proposed revision of the Crown Lands Ordinance, 1902 and such other business as might be laid before it.

PRESENT.

Board:—The Hon. the Secretary for Lands and Colonies, Mr. C. G. Hilly, Director of Surveys (Major E. G. Smith, M.A.) Land Officer (Mr. R. H. Wright, M.A.) and Mr. A. S. Fleemmer.

1. It was proposed by Major Leggett, seconded by Mr. Baillie and carried.

That the Hon. the Commissioner for Lands and Colonies be asked to copy the Deputation to the Colonial Office covering the suggestions of the Law Board as to the revision of the Crown Lands Ordinance might be laid before the Board.

2. The Board having heard the recommendations of a Deputation of the Planters' Association with regard to the treatment of Crown Lands, the following further suggestions to make in connection with the revision of the Crown Lands Ordinance.

(1) That the Board consider that the state of rest as recommended by the Law Board is not suitable for White Colonisation and should be applied to land at the Coast also and that on this basis the gradation of lands is undesirable.

(2) That the Board is of the opinion that the necessity of white occupation on Coast Lands should be dispensed with.

(3) That the Board is of the opinion that it has recommended that white occupation on Coast Lands should not be a necessary condition of settlement, the advantage to be effected on such land to entitle the issue of High of Occupation should stand at 90 times the amount as recommended.

(4) With regard to the recommendations of the Planters' Association as to Partnerships the Board is of opinion that the danger of an undue looking up of land by partnerships or companies can be prevented by a strict adherence to the conditions of development Mr. Wright wishes to record that in his opinion such partnership development should only be allowed with the consent of the Hon. the Commissioner of Lands and not as recommended by the Planters' Association, permissible on a notice in writing to the Commissioner of Lands without such consent.

(5) That the Board recommends that Recommendation No. XVI, viz. that the size of lots for sale should be fixed by the Commissioner of Lands by and with the approval of the Law Board, for the revision of the Crown Lands Ordinance, shall apply to Coast Lands as well as to the Highlands.

It was decided to hold the next meeting of the Board on the 16th at Nairobi on the 3rd January 1908.

4. The question of the issue of free passes on the Railway to non-official members of the Board was brought up by Major Leggett.
