The Aga Khan has telegraphed to the Viceroy requesting timely intervention to prevent counter-violence by Indians with disastrous effects to the political situation in India. It is stated in official circles in London that the negotiations between the Colonial Secretary and Sir Robert Coryndon are still proceeding and a settlement is unlikely for some time; but at present there is reason to hope for a solution satisfactory to all parties.

SHUTS REPLIES TO CRITICS.

Thinks His Government Deserves Credit.

BOLEHEVED NATIVES.

Capitane, Jan. 23. General Boleheved, the Premier, speaking in reply to the criticisms of the Government was entitled to credit for the manner in which it had brought the country through the present period of depression aggravated by drought and revolution with the national credit unimpaired. He declared that natives were at present studying in the Fisheries Ministry at Moscow and would eventually return to South Africa. The Premier compared the conditions of European colonies on the edge of a precipice and called attention to the prominence of South Africa's situation through a handful of Whites torn by internal divisions. The debate was again adjourned.

The following is a detailed report of the meeting at Nakuru this week on the Indian question, the resolution passed having already appeared in the Standard. There were over 500 settlers present.

The dining room of the Hotel was packed many being up since to gain admission and the meeting was one of the most calm and collected, not a hot-headed speech among the many speakers, it was however a determined meeting and a unanimous one and everyone left with the determination to do all in their power. Mr. T. Theakrah was unanimously elected to the chair. In a few words he opened the meeting which he explained had to be called at short notice in order to take some action in the Nairobi Province. Continuing, Mr. Theakrah stated that the despatch had not yet been made public but he assured the meeting that the situation was serious. He earnestly asked the meeting to consider the question in a calm and responsible light as every word would eventually go to the Colonial Office.

Mr. J. Beeton in proposing the resolutions (already reported in the Standard), asked the meeting unanimously to support them so only by unanimity would the Europeans win their cause. The Convention of Associations and the Legislative Council required the whole-hearted backing of the white community he said and he hoped

that they were told to consider the Imperial point of view. With regard to this the English nation had always been the greatest maintaining people—who had pledged themselves to give the native races of this country security and justice and on this point by what right should they share this responsibility with any Asiatic race? In conclusion he asked for unity, firmness and restraint among the settlers as no false move must be taken to prejudice their rights.

The meeting was then thrown open for discussion Major Macdonald, referred to his visit to India last year. He had heard Indians speak in the Delhi Legislative Council but it was difficult to convey his feeling of that meeting to the settlers of this Colony. He assured the meeting that they were up against the whole of India.

It was difficult to see why such anxiety had been necessary and likewise asked for an order not to prejudice this question from the Europeans. Pledges had been given by high officials, and if they went back on their word, continued Major Macdonald, "we have been betrayed by men of our own race. During the silence the Indians had been working with money at their back well up against the Europeans, and it seemed if they, as a Colony, required to remain purely British they should have to appeal to other Colonies to assist them."

said that he had not intended coming to the meeting as he was in the difficult position of being on the Executive Council. Continuing he stated he agreed with all the resolutions put forward. Certain people who have been constructive in the past, in the matter were to meet the Governor on Saturday when he hoped the despatch in question from the Colonial Office would be made public.

Mr. Churchill said ways must be found to a white governed country and the strictest immigration control and it is his belief that we must stick to the Indian point but we must be the "country," said Lord Dunsire. The people who had to say to the Government "we can't accept these things" must have the power to do so and to force the whole Colony at their back.

Col. Weir asked if loss was not the issue for action. At last the Chairman replied that what policy it would be necessary to adopt but it was the idea of a central committee who would not mix with Natives who would take what steps they thought necessary.

Lord Dunsire asked if there was not a risk that while the meetings of associations were taking place they should not be sold again. He said he would like an assurance that before the settlers were asked to bind themselves to wait for concerted action no steps would be taken by the Colonial and Indian Offices to enforce the Bill.

Lord Dunsire replied that as presumably the Colonial Office had agreed to these conversations it was unlikely they would commit such a breach of faith and that in any case any change in the constitution would have to be embodied in a Bill which would come before the Legislative Council, that that meant action in the Gazette and that the only way that a Bill could be rushed through was by a notice of motion signed by both the Governor and the suspension of standing orders and that it was unthinkable that such action would be taken while negotiations were actually proceeding.

The chairman explained that the whole object of the meeting was to happen if any Bill was introduced and that the Colonists would take whatever stern measures they thought necessary after negotiations had broken down. In opposing this they must risk all. Mr. Theakrah then put the resolutions to the meeting and the question was passed unanimously. A question was asked if everyone was on the roll and available if necessary. Mr. Beeton replied that he was leaving down and that each day he had been asked to appoint group leaders.

The following resolution was also put to the meeting: That the Convention of Associations and the Associated Chamber of Commerce requested to pass a resolution protesting against the recent appointment of Mr. Ormsby-Gore as the Secretary of State for the Colonies in view of the numerous complaints expressed by him in the House of Commons on July 4, 1925 that he was requested to pay a large sum of money to him for himself the conditions and the terms of such resolution be sent to H. E. The Governor and the Colonial Secretary. The resolution was passed unanimously.

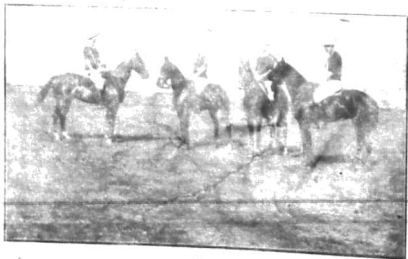

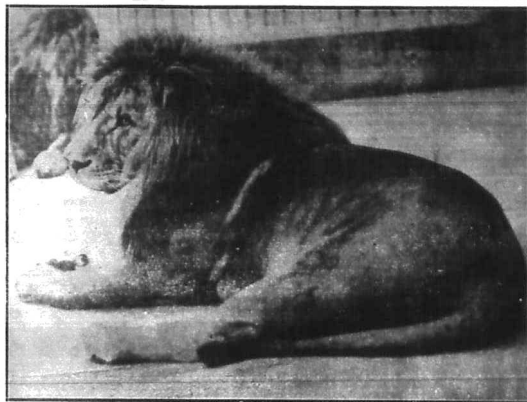

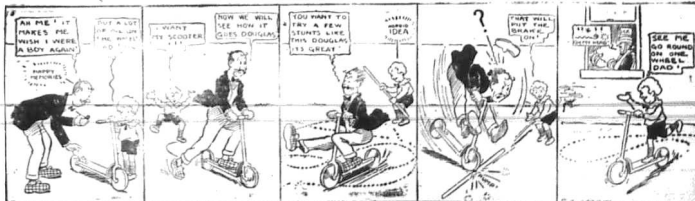

The Editor, "A.E.
