



Mr. Maurice Macmillan in his first speech, in the House of Commons at Westminster, has defined the policy of the party for next year and it is up to the country to keep steady.

He has promised that the railway project in the East African colonies will be given a go-ahead in his opinion, and in his introductory statement appears the figure of £100,000,000 as a grant aid to Kenya and Uganda.

20 - 50 CEDAR FLITCHES.

1. Tenders are required for the supply of the above logs and flitches for use at Uganda Railways.

2. Tenders for part, or the whole, of the above quantities will be considered.

3. Tenders must state definitely within what period the logs and/or flitches will be delivered.

4. The price should be £ per ton of 50 cubic feet.

5. Logs to be measured by the quarter girth system under the bark.

6. Logs to be not less than 18 feet in length with a girth not less than 4 inches in any part of the log. The average girth of logs to be not less than 18 feet.

7. The Cedar flitches are not to be less than 18 feet by 12 inches by 6 inches.

8. Logs and flitches to be straight, free from twisted growth or knots.

9. Forks also free from large, dead or loose knots, shanks and other imperfections.

10. Logs and flitches will be supplied by the Railway before loading into trucks and payment will be made on receipt of the logs and flitches at the Uganda Railway Workshops, Nairobi.

11. Sealed tenders for "TENDER FOR LOGS & FLITCHES" should reach the Chief Superintendent, Uganda Railways, P.O. Box 200, Nairobi, not later than the 25th February, 1954. Tenders received after this date will not be considered.

12. The lowest or any Tender will not be accepted.


In the Lords.
