MUKONO COLLEGE

Bishop Tucker Memorial.

This week Weekly Edition continues its series of reports on the economy of the Central Block of the Bishop Tucker Memorial College of which Mr. C. A. Acting Secretary, Mr. W. G. Hartman, is the founder. This foundation stone of this building was laid by the Right Rev. Dr. John R. Kenworthy in November 1919. The block is built of stone and is enclosed by a solid entrance wall with a gate and a small arched gateway. The Lecture Hall wing stands at either end.

CARDS IN POCKET.

Writing in the *Cape Argus* the other day, states that tennis rules are usually broken from sheer forgetfulness, but that is not entirely true. The tournament referee does not always know what happens to him if he does not do his duty; accidents happen to him, too. He is not infallible, nor is he omniscient; ignorance is, if anything, more excusable than forgetfulness.

I go to say, for I am not a tennis player, that the referee's main task is to make sure that the game is to make forgetfulness as far as possible. The full penalty, even then, the referee is bound to award, should at that point in the loss of a game, set, or match, be called for. The referee's added powers are mostly used.

We had, recently, an incident in a tournament at Nairobi in the way the horse of these notes was treated. It was during a service. He frequently jumps slightly as he serves, so it is the referee's duty to serve at least six inches. I saw one serve which was "otherwise wise" and the opponent, who was serving, claimed this ruled meant game, set, and match. The referee, however, ruled out "fault," before the latter had been served, and awarded the fault. The server came in to the net, and asked what the referee intended. The referee, who had been told that the server understood that the opponent had been given a free service, said nothing, but made no effort to explain his ruling.
