My Lord,

I have the honour to report that since the sale of the Protectorate S.S. "Juba", Moosa Fakir, the second mate, has been without employment. During his 14 years service he has done excellent work and has always been well reported on by the officers under whom he has served and I regret extremely that I am unable to offer him any suitable employment in the Protectorate.

2. I have, under the circumstances, the honour to recommend that he be granted a pension on the basis of his pay and messing allowance. I believe I am correct in saying that he would be entitled to some additional pension on account of abolition of office and would suggest for Your Lordship's favourable consideration that he should be granted a pension amounting to one third of his pay, i.e. on 14 years service and 6 years allowance for abolition of office.

I have the honor to ack. the receipt of ~~your~~ ^{Mr. Jackson's} despatch No. 487 of the 23rd of August, recommending the grant of a pension to Messrs. Fisher, late second mate of the S.S.
