History of the last illness



Mr. Hiley suffered from frequent attacks of Malarial fever but was otherwise in good health.

On the evening of the 14th November he had an attack of Fever which on the morning of the 15th declared itself as Blackwater Fever.

The collector at once despatched runners to Fort Hall and telegraphed to Nairobi for further medical assistance. On receipt of these messages a medical officer was sent from Fort Hall and another from Nairobi, but the attack was a very severe one and although every thing that possibly be done for him was done, he died at 1.15 p.m. on the 17th November.

With the exception of frequent mild attacks of Malarial fever patient had enjoyed good health.

2. History of last illness including treatment.

14th

Complained of being out of sorts but thought it was only one of his ordinary malarial attacks at 7 pm temp 101°

15th

At 1 am temp 104° Relieved vomiting set in and he began to pass rusty colored almost black urine. Bowels opened once. Vomiting continued throughout the day. Temp. 4 pm 104°

16th

Haemoglobinuria and vomiting returned. Temp. am 103°. Slept little and very restless. Markedly increasing weakness. Temp. 102°

17th

Temp 102°, much weaker, faint. Occurs delirious at 6 pm and died at 1.15 pm. Was given at first Phenacetin and Quinine, Barley Water, Digitalis, and stimulants.

3. Post mortem appearances.
