Sir:-

I am directed by Secretary Sir E. Grey to acknowledge the receipt of your letter 432 of the 28th ultimo, containing further information on three points in connection with the proposed establishment of a municipality at Mombasa.

I am to state in reply that

(1) Extra-territorial jurisdiction in the ten mile strip has been surrendered by all the Powers but that the various Treaties with their most-favoured-nation clauses still exist.

(2) Even supposing that the German-Zanzibar Treaty of 1885 had lapsed or was non-existent, the most-favoured-nation clauses still apply to the French Treaty with Zanzibar so that it would not be possible to differentiate between French citizens and other foreigners. All foreigners must be rated, or

none.
