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Sir:-

In reply to your letter 23666/09 of the 13th ultimo. relative to the rating of the Subjects of Powers having Treaties with Zanzibar, I am directed by Secretary Sir E. Grey to state, for the information of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, that this Department has in this matter proceeded throughout upon the assumption that, in the absence of any specific provision in a Treaty conferring extra territorial rights against the payment of taxes, the immunity, which the subject of a Treaty Power does in fact enjoy from the levy of local taxes, is due to the inability of the local sovereign to enforce his will upon a recalcitrant individual who refuses to pay the taxes imposed. This condition, however, has ceased to operate in Zanzibar because the jurisdiction over the subjects of all the Treaty Powers has been transferred to the British Court, and so long as the British Authorities are willing to enforce the

Sultan's imposition of taxation the subjects of the freaty.

Powers can be made to pay the taxes that the Sultan levies on them.

On the expiration, therefore, of the German Treety in 1911, which contains in Article IX.2-Second (b) a specific provision articles German subjects being liable to any Zanziber taxation other than that enumerated in Articles VII and VIII, there will, if the above stated principle is sound, be no longer any bar to the levy of Zanziber Taxation upon the subjects of Treaty Powers, provided that such taxation is imposed by a Decree which will be enforced by the British Court.

I am also directed by Sir F. Grey to enclose herewith translation of a note which has been addressed to him by the German Charge d'Affaires, from which it will be observed that the German Government admit that their Treaty with Zanzibar expires in 1911. It am to add that Sir E. Crey is advised that after that date there will be no Power enjoying such Treaty Rights in the Protectorate as will prevent rates from being levied on their subjects either in Zanzibar or Mombass.

The British Ambassador at Berlin addressed to the German Government under date of February 1, 1906, a note relative to the question of the treaty relations between the German Empire and Zanzibar. The German Government replied to this note on August 7 of the same year.

The British Government are not yet replied to the proposals contained in the latter note.

As the expiration of the existing treat would result in the year 1911 in an absence of any treaty (einen vertraglosen Zustand schaffen), the German Government would be grateful for information of the matter.
