In reply to Your Lordship's despatch No. 3
of the 7th ultimo I have the honour to say that I am
entirely in favour of the provision of some form of
mosquito-protection in the case of all quarters
occupied by officials.

2. My experience has, however, been that such
protection, if the climate is at all hot, is liable
to be disregarded unless it is so arranged that the
occupant suffers no extra discomfort in consequence
of its use. The best method of obtaining this
result I have found to be the provision of a small
mosquito-proof bedroom placed either on the verandah
of the house or outside it. The cost ought not to

be great, and I am instructing the Commissioner
Public Works Department, to consider the possibility
of introducing the scheme.

5. I am also strongly of opinion that the necessity
for utilizing such protective apparatus as is provided
for their benefit should be impressed upon all
officers and that they should be informed that any
sickness arising from neglect in this respect may be
held to be due to their own fault.
